

Starkey-Callahan Bout February 22

Klamath fight fans who for many weeks have been whetting their sporting appetites in anticipation of feasting on a regular fight card, are likely to have another opportunity to watch two popular fist favorites, Kid Starkey and Tim Callahan, in a main event go here February 22.

Matchmaker Eddie Duback is now working on what he hopes will prove a truly sensational card for February 22, and for a ten-round main event he expects to sign up Callahan and Starkey.

That this would prove a popular scrap for all fans is almost an established fact. These two fast boys went ten rounds here last winter to a referee's decision in favor of Callahan, an official edict which met with disapproval in the minds of about half the house.

While many, of course, were in accordance with the decision which gave Tim the battle's honor, others felt that it should either have been a draw, or been declared in Starkey's favor.

The fight was a closely contested exhibition of boxing prowess. Both fighters are popular and have large followings, and both are exceedingly capable with handfuls of padded leather. There are two angles on the decision, both more or less justified, undoubtedly.

Anyway, Duback hopes to effect a settlement of any controversy that may have arisen as a result of the former battle, by matching the two fighters for a main event this month. Considerable interest has already been aroused in Eddie's proposal and it is expected that this bout, as well as other good ones that will appear on the card, will prove widely popular.

The plan of the new boxing commission and matchmaker is to put Klamath boxing on the highest possible level, both from a standpoint of good fighting and business management. Fighters will work on a straight percentage basis, and later in the season when the game has been put on its feet financially here, it is expected that some of the best scrappers on the coast will be brought in to exhibit their fist wares on the local canvas.

Stribling Defeats California Fighter

MADISON SQUARE GARDEN, New York, Feb. 7. (U. N.)—Young Stribling of Georgia made an impressive New York debut as a heavyweight Monday night when he defeated Eddie Huffman of California in ten rounds before 3,735 fight fans, the smallest crowd of the season, at Madison Square Garden.

Defeating Huffman is no great stunt and Stribling was far from scoring even a knockdown, but considering his long vacation the Georgian has experienced from the ring, his work against the lumbering ex-sailor was effective.

Stribling won eight of the ten rounds, Huffman one, and another was even. The southerner was always Eddie's master as a boxer, and completely baffled the Californian.

With both "Pa" Stribling and his new manager, "Squawk" Miller, in his corner, the Georgia youngster shaped up strong at 177½ pounds, the same weight as Huffman.

Dempsey Insists On Comeback Try

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 7. (U. N.)—Jack Dempsey, recovering from a serious attack of blood poisoning, is still determined to carry on his campaign to regain the heavyweight championship of the world, his wife, Estelle Taylor, said here tonight.

"Jack's arm and hand will be as good as ever in a few weeks," the screen actress said, "and except for a short postponement his training plans are the same as before the illness."

Dempsey was entirely out of danger tonight, and in a much better frame of mind than at any time since he contracted the poisoning, the former champion's wife said.

"The doctor has assured Jack that his arm and hand will heal soundly and that has helped him in his quick recovery, but he probably will be forced to remain in bed at least a week longer."

After all effects of the poisoning have disappeared, Mrs. Dempsey said, Jack will go to the mountains to prepare for his proposed bout with Tunney. He will confine his early training to roadwork and woodchopping and will do no boxing until he is sure his hand can stand the strain.
