SOCIETY LOOKS FORWARD TO THE COLONIAL BALL

One of the objects of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution is the "acquisition and protection of historic spots and the erection of monuments." One of the most interesting historic spots in Klamath county is the old stone bridge across Lost river, below Merrill. In 1846, the Applegate and others crossed Lost river on this bridge when blazing the trail for a southern route for immigrants to the Oregon country. For many years the pioneers of Oregon crossed Lost river on this bridge when making their first entrance into the Oregon country. The government dam now rests on this stone bridge.

The proceeds from the Annual Colonial ball to be given by Eulalona chapter D. A. R., February 22, 1927, will be used for the erection of a marker at the Lost river stone bridge. This ball is to be given at the Altamont pavilion. The grand march will be at nine o'clock, led by Mrs. O. H. Harshbarger, past state regent of California, and Captain Applegate, the distinguished son of the American Revolution of this city. Members of Eulalona chapter will dress in colonial costume, all others wear what they wish.
