

Burke-Walsh Bout On Tapis Tonight At Memorial Hall

Considerable interest is being evinced along sport row in the championship wrestling match to be held in the Legion hall here Thursday evening, when Henry Burke, who holds the Pacific coast middle-weight grappling title clashes with Harry Walsh, challenger, for the main event.

Burke, at first reluctant to put up the belt which he won sometime ago from Basantha Singh, has agreed to a championship bout, so Walsh will have an opportunity to make himself a name in coast wrestling circles if he succeeds in pinning the champ to the mat.

Both wrestlers are high class men and there is no doubt that Thursday night's entertainment will be the best in this line that has been offered Klamath sport fans. Brady Montgomery is promoting the wrestling card and assures patrons that one-price tickets will entitle them to a look on a real sporting event.

Walsh is a crack grappler from the sunny south where he is considered one of the best. He has been wrestling there for the past three years, taking all comers successfully. The challenger, who first suggested the terms—winner take all—that the two are wrestling under is confident that the Pacific coast belt held by Burke is going to change hands. Burke on the other hand, is fully prepared to protect his interest, so the outcome will be interesting.

Harold Christy, formerly of this city and now in southern California where he has been active in wrestling, has stated that he will challenge the winner of Thursday's main event, so Klamath fans may get to see more wrestling before many more months.

George Coudry and Carl Yancy are doing one preliminary bout. Both men weigh 165 and are experienced grapplers, so it is expected that this match in itself will be well worth while. The same applies to another preliminary between Bert Goddard and Jackie Walters, who wrestle at 145 pounds. Tickets for the match are on sale at the Mecca, Waldorf and Rex pool halls.

KIECKHEFER REGAINS BILLIARD CHAMPIONSHIP

CHICAGO, Feb. 15, (U.N.)—Angie Kieckhefer, former national three-cushion billiard champion, tonight regained the crown by defeating Otto Reisel of Philadelphia, the present champion, in a final match, 50 to 29. The match went only 31 innings and lasted 23 minutes, a record for a championship match.

Kieckhefer made a high run of five and Reisel six. Kieckhefer is awarded a purse of \$1,200, a salary of \$250 a month for the period of his championship, 24 per cent of the gate receipts and a diamond emblem valued at \$1,000.

At any rate the thorn continues to rankle and the supporters of both fighters will be out full force February 22 to see how these showy battlers settle the old score. The card will commence at 8:30 on the night of Washington's birthday, Duback announced, and will be staged in the Legion hall back of the county courthouse.

In the semi-windup fans will see a fight which bids to outdo the main event for excitement. Wilbur Harrington, that Indian wildcat who has left his mark on many a battler's physiognomy in the local ring, will meet a flashy lad from Wallace, Idaho, for this event, the latter being none other than Sol Dene, a 145-pounder whose battle-scarred mug has been much on the sporting pages of northwest chronicles during the past three years.

Harrington needs no introduction here, as all who have seen the bronze boxer, work know that his hands and feet move fast and effectively. As for the boy Dene, he once fought Jack Crim in this city and after Crim had knocked him down three times in the first round, staged a comeback and finally won the decision. He's good.

Trap Shooters to Consolidate Many Scatter-Gun Clubs

Word comes to local scatter-gun artists that tentative plans are being made for the consolidation of the various trap shooting organizations in the county into one parent organization. Those backing the move feel that the big organization would draw support from the combined trap shooting fraternity of the county and would mean more and better sport for everybody concerned.

The Modoc Point and Pelican City clubs have already consolidated and have acquired 18 acres of land a half mile north of terminal city to be used as a shooting ground. Later a club house may be erected on the grounds.

During the past season there were clubs at Keno, Modoc Point, and Pelican City and it is expected that the Keno club will soon join with the other two. The support accorded the individual clubs last year, according to members, was hardly sufficient to justify the maintenance of three separate organizations and the consolidation plan has been talked for some time.

The new club is to be known as the Klamath Gun club and application has been made for entry in the Oregon state telegraphic trap shooting tournament which will start February 20. First leg of the shoot will be held at Modoc Point traps until the new equipment can be installed at the new shooting grounds, and all members are urged to participate.
