

Starkey-Callahan Settle Old Scores In Fight Tonight

The music of smacking leather, so tuneful to the ears of fight fans, will resound in the Legion hall tonight as never before when a brace of brilliant glove performers in the main event, supported by a skilled cast in the preliminaries, stage one of the best boxing shows Klamath sports have ever cheered.

Interest in the main event bout between Kid Starkey and Tim Callahan, popular ring contenders of this city, is mounting sky high and it is predicted that Eddie Duback will need plenty of cops on deck tonight to keep all members of the fight audience watching the ring bout instead of exercising home-made talent on the sidewalks.

Callahan, the battling Irishman who won a decision over Starkey here months ago, has bet that he will K. O. the Kid in three rounds. The Kid says Callahan couldn't knock him out in 30 rounds, let alone ten, and strengthens the declaration that he will revise Callahan's opinion of himself by putting the Irishman to the canvas for a decalogue of dream counts. Anyway, she'll be a real fight and worthy of a main event position on a top-notch Frisco card.

Then there's some more kayo cream promised for tonight in the semi-windup between Sol Deane and Wilbur Harrington, Indian. This gay Deane, who is good with his fists and knows it, says nobody in Klamath Falls can knock him out, and adds that he can scalp any redskin that ever mixed gloves with a paleface. Sol comes from a fighting mining town and as he cut several broad patches of bronze from the face of Jack Crim here many moons ago, many local fans are inclined to take the Wallace miner at his word. But Sol wouldn't be the first Wil Harrington surprised with his dynamite fists, if he does—and he may.

The curtain goes up at 8:30 when Billy Huff and Joe York, the latter of Seattle persuasion, jump into the ring for a four-round preliminary. It may last four rounds and it may not. They might knock each other out simultaneously in the first round. Can't tell about prelims.

Kid Ryder meets Battling Bob, of Algoma, in the four-round special which follows the preliminary fight. Ryder comes up a notch and tonight gets a chance to step out of the preliminary class. As the boy has many good points—two of the best being on the ends of his arms—he probably will put up the fight of his life to get Bob

The latter invades the local fight picture as a stanger and somewhat of a dark horse. He'll get his best introduction in the ring tonight. Duback is keeping the name of the referee secret. He's a new man here, he stated, and is a good one. It is expected that this evening's festivities will clear up the question as to the new ref's ability, however. Wide interest in the main and semi events, coupled with the fact that local fans are hungry for a fight card after a restricted diet since the first of the year, promises a full house tonight, is the belief of those backing the scrap.

Champion Trapper Makes New Record

OAKLAND, Calif., Feb. 21. (U. N.)—E. A. Ehmann, government duck-master, claims the world record for duck trapping.

In a few days' campaign he has trapped 1,000 ducks, mudhens and geese. His largest haul was 600 in one day.

Waterfowl thus captured are banded with distinctive leg tags, so that the U. S. biological survey may trace the movements of migratory birds.

Of the 600 birds trapped in the one day, Ehmann found that 120 had been tagged previously. Many of them were trapped at Lake Merritt in January, 1926. During the interval they had flown into the Arctic circle, nested, and returned.

TITHING BILL ORDERED POSTPONED INDEFINITELY

SALEM, Feb. 21. (U. N.)—The senate indefinitely postponed the tithing bill Monday after a spirited debate.

Indian Coach Goes To Northwestern

EVANSTON, Ill., Feb. 21. (U. N.)—Richard Hanley, Haskell Indians' coach, today was chosen to succeed Glen Thistlethwaite as coach of Northwestern university.

The announcement was made by K. L. Wilson, director of athletics. Thistlethwaite resigned to become coach at Wisconsin.

Hanley will take up his duties at Northwestern March 5.

Hanley, a graduate of Washington State university in the class of 1919, has enjoyed an enviable record as coach of the Indian team. He has held that post for five years. Last year his team won 12 games, tied one and lost none.

Before going to Haskell, Hanley coached at Pendleton, Ore.

He is now at his home in Lawrence, Kansas. It is understood he will accept the appointment.
