

Health Officer Had Busy Month

Included in the report for the month of February, compiled in the office of Dr. G. S. Newsom, county health authority, 639 men, women and children were vaccinated through the Klamath county health unit, one of the largest numbers ever to submit to vaccination during a like period in the county.

The report included other data, such as: educational lectures and talks, 2; attendance, 80; literature distributed, 110; press articles, 5; exhibits and demonstrations, 1.

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 28, (U.N.)—The city of Pasadena and the Tournament of Roses association may be saved litigation involving more than a million dollars as a result of the ruling made today by the supreme court, acting in what was called a test case.

The ruling sustained the demurrer of the city to four damage suits filed by parties who suffered injuries in the grandstand crash at Pasadena during the tournament of roses parade January 1, 1926.
