only one exception important political questions affecting Europe's eastern frontier. Similarly all private conversations between the council members will center on the eastern frontier and on the dramatic situation in south China.

A feeling of general relief resulted from a statement from Chao hsin-chu Chinese league delegate, that he had no intention of forcing the Chinese question to the front during the council's sessions. Public discussion of the activities of foreign powers in Shanghai and vicinity opposed by English and other foreign nations will be avoided, it is now believed.

Private discussions between league members will include, in addition to the Chinese situation, which is admittedly foremost, Lithuania's treaty with Russia, England's new policy of friendship with Poland which certain nations fear is directed against Russia.

WEED TO KLAMATH HIGHWAY ASSURED

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the vital need of the Weed to Klamath road, and promised to do his best to get the proposition financed through other sources. The state highway commission also pledged its support to the Weed to Klamath highway, and assured President Carl Phelps of the Weed to Klamath association and Assemblyman Murphy that a means would be found for financing the construction of this highway.

Just what funds could be used for the financing of the Weed to Klamath highway was not mentioned by either Governor Young or the highway commission, but both gave the assurance that the road could, and would, be built in the very near future.

According to the tone of news reports from Sacramento and the interest shown by the governor and the state highway commission, as well as many other high officials, it seems safe to say that a large percentage of the tourist traffic of 1928 will be routed over the Weed to Klamath highway.

The apparent success of this road movement is the result of more than twenty years of effort on the part of Shastya county, California, which developed into the terrific drive made this winter in support of the Murphy bill.

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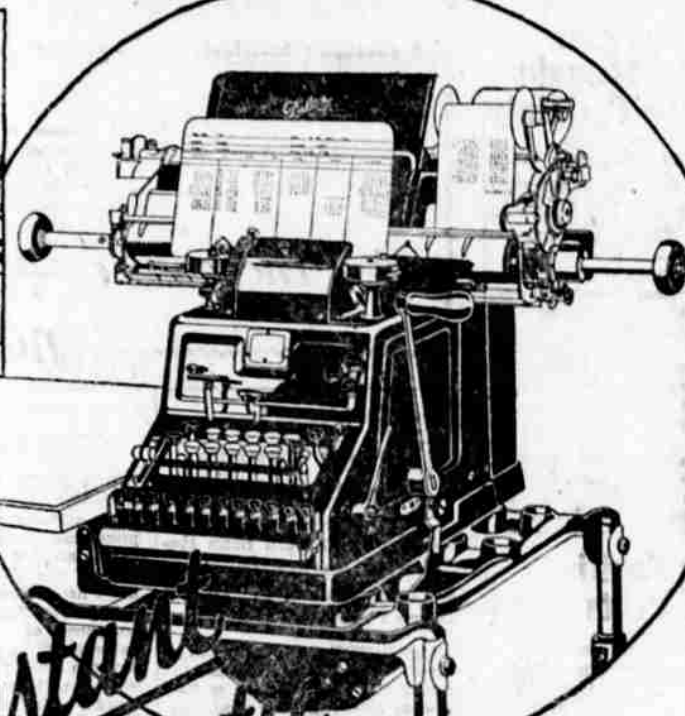
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
