aside and a new one made which will be free from objection," the opinion states.

"The cruising contract could not be effected by this change," he continues. "If any contracts have been made since the former levy which the court feels should be protected, then the court can re-execute such contracts. Such a proceeding would remove any question as to the validity of such contracts. If a new contract for cruising is made it should be more carefully drawn to protect the interests of the county which were very much neglected in drawing the old one."

"The budget law and the orders of the court disclose that approximately \$10,000 more was expended for cruising than the law permits. The money unlawfully paid out should be recovered. It was not a temporary transfer of funds, but a new appropriation (or budget) of funds later found or made available."
