

Arrested Man Gets His Walking Papers

James G. Bates, alias James E. Lloyd, wanted in Los Angeles on a four-year-old charge of grand larceny, had a scare thrown into him yesterday when he was brought before Police Judge Lem L. Gaghagen and fined \$100 and committed to 30 days in the city jail.

Chief of Police Keith Ambrose arrested Bates, alias Lloyd, a week ago on the streets, recognizing him from a bulletin sent out by the Los Angeles police. The southern officials ordered him released on insufficient evidence. The offender was then discharged, on the condition that he leave town.

Ambrose arrested him again yesterday and brought him into police court. Gaghagen remitted the fine and commitment in the event that Bates take the next train out, which he seemed glad to do.

MURDERER OF BOY TO KNOW FATE SOON

CHICAGO, March 12. (U.N.)—The maze of scientific evidence introduced by both state and defense in the trial of Harold Croarkin for the murder of six-year-old Walter Schmitt has ended, and Monday morning attorneys will begin the final arguments in the case.

The defense at the close of this afternoon's session of court, unexpectedly waived the right to rebuttal evidence, and the prosecution rested.

Assistant State's Attorney Joseph Savage will bring the arguments Monday. He will be followed by the defense counsel, of which Patrick H. O'Donnell, nationally known criminal lawyer, will make the chief talk to the jury.

State's Attorney Robert E. Crowe will close the state arguments with a plea that Croarkin be hanged. The defense will ask that the jury free the defendant on the ground that he was insane at the time of the crime.

Croarkin's attorneys announced tonight that in case the jury's verdict is considered too severe, they will immediately move that he be given a sanity hearing.
