

Ball Club Men to Search Batteries In College Towns

"Sandy" Saunders, manager of the local nine, and Tom Dillon, who is taking an active interest in the formation of a creditable team for this city, left here Sunday for a tour of California colleges in search of a crack battery for the Klamath Falls ball club.

Dillon and Saunders will first go to Ashland where they planned to sign up with either the Southern Oregon Baseball league, or the Northern California Baseball league.

"It all depends on which group can offer us the best ball," Dillon stated Saturday night. "It may be that a schedule can be worked up whereby Klamath plays with the biggest and best teams in both leagues but whatever happens, will sign with the group with the brightest aspect."

From Ashland, Dillon and Saunders will leave for Berkeley where they will confer with coaches on baseball material among the college men. The two will also go to San Francisco and visit St. Mary's, where some of the best coast material has been ground out, to Stanford, at Palo Alto and then home.

Sapiro Takes Ford Suit in Own Hands

DETROIT, March 28. (U.N.)—Aaron Sapiro has taken his million dollar suit against Henry Ford into his own hands.

The Jewish attorney's line of attack was indicated late Monday afternoon, when he had his counsel put him on the witness stand and began reviewing the history of his far flung operations as an organizer of farmers' cooperatives.

Sapiro hopes to explain his connection with these concerns and in this way prove that he was not as Henry Ford charged in his magazine, the Dearborn Independent, seeking to set himself up as czar of the world's food industries for his own profit.

Earlier in the afternoon session of the trial, now in its third week, Judge Raymond had encouraged Sapiro by denying the Ford lawyer's motion to declare the case a mistrial because of amended pleadings, filed by the plaintiff.

Ford's attorneys fought bitterly for several hours, but lost the argument. Sapiro was just getting wound up when court adjourned. It is estimated that his testimony will take up all of Tuesday and perhaps extend well into Wednesday.

SHANGHAI FOREIGN QUARTERS NOW SAFE

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had arrived here were packed in to the already crowded houses of friends and some even were lodged in mission offices. As steamship reservations have been filled for weeks in advance many of these workers have been ousted from their field and are making frantic efforts to get passages of any kind. The United States consulate told the United News that no efforts have been made to relieve the congestion thus far, due to the greater necessity of crowding every foreign national into Shanghai.

Conditions, it was said at the consulate, are becoming worse daily. While the agitation against foreigners was going on in Wuhu, Cantonese carried banners through the streets on which were written the charge that 200,000 Chinese had been killed by the bullets of American and British warships, shelling Nanking.

Wholesale evacuation of foreigners down the Yangtze valley to Shanghai and the tramp of marching marines in the United States marked Monday's major developments in the Chinese anti-foreign crisis.

Cables from the Far East told of a lull in Shanghai where victorious Cantonese had appeared menacingly at the barricaded gates of American and British concessions harboring refugees from Nanking and other points where they had been forced to flee from rioters.

The movement down the Yangtze valley was conducted under grave dangers at some points due to the anti-foreign uprisings in several localities along the way.

Banners being carried through the streets of Wuhu proclaimed that American and British troops had killed 200,000 Chinese when they fired on Nanking March 24.

In the United States where the navy department was receiving reports from its officers in China, 1,500 more marines were preparing to be on their way to the Pacific coast, en route to China within 24 hours. Affecting scenes were enacted at several eastern concentration points as the soldiers bid their relatives and sweethearts goodbye.

According to the Daily Mail's Shanghai correspondent the Cantonese are mounting large guns on Lion hill, Nanking, overlooking the Yangtze river and are training them on American and British warships and merchant vessels anchored off the waterfront.

Southern Oregon Ball League is Fully Organized

Klamath Falls became a part of the Southern Oregon baseball league Sunday when that association was officially organized Sunday afternoon in Ashland. Representatives of teams from Klamath Falls, Ashland, Medford and Grants Pass were present at the meeting and named May 1 as the official opening of baseball in southern Oregon.

"Red" Saunders, manager of the Klamath nine, and Tom Dillon, actively interested in the formation of the league and Klamath's entry, represented the local group. From Ashland they continued to Berkeley, San Francisco and Palo Alto where they will line up new material for the Klamath aggregation from the colleges.

One of the most important changes which directors of the league will make this season is the playing of a split season. The first half will close July 1, and the second half the latter part of August.

A. C. Nitzinger, of Ashland, is president of the league, and J. Williamson of Medford, secretary and treasurer. Williamson was ordered to draw up a schedule and submit it to directors in order to play ball as soon as possible.

A delegation from the Siskiyou county league, including Weed, Mt. Shasta, Dunsmuir and Yreka, sat in on the meeting of the Southern Oregon league and arranged for the champions of the southern group to play the Oregon winners at the close of the seasons in July and September.

No player can be traded from one team to another without the consent of managers or directors of all clubs, according to a new ruling that was met with approval by all present Sunday. Another change which will materially affect the game this summer is the naming of the umpires by President Nitzinger. Arbiters will be paid by the league instead of individual clubs.

In the meanwhile Mrs. Grayson left the truck and advanced within a few feet of the struggling men. Just as she approached the gun exploded in the hands of her father-in-law, the bullet piercing her abdomen and passing completely through the body, according to physicians.

Deputy Sheriff Vardley of Malin immediately arrested the elder Grayson and turned him over to local officials who placed him in the county jail on an open charge, about 2 a. m. Sunday.

Mrs. Grayson is the mother of three children, Dorothy, 5, Audrey, 3½, and Robert, 2. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George W. Myers, well known Malin residents, and besides her parents, husband and children is survived by three sisters, Mrs. Nels Fogle and Mrs. Mahle Fogle of Malin, and Miss Eva Myers of San Francisco, and two brothers, David and Byron Myers of Malin.

Mrs. Grayson was born June 15, 1899, in Humboldt county, Kansas. She was married to Albert Grayson six years ago and has made her home near Malin since that time.

Remains are at the Earl Whitlock funeral home and funeral arrangements will be announced later.
