

Tigers Loom for American Honors

NEW YORK, March 31. (U.N.)—Most of the ball clubs in the American league are beginning to voice appreciation of the Detroit Tigers as strong contenders in the coming pennant race.

A kind word from its rivals at this stage of this season is about as useful to a ball club as a floral horse-shoe is to a boxer just before a fight.

In fact, both have been known to act as the most terrible sort of jinx.

Every time the Boston Braves were praised in March they hit the cellar with a sickening thud about the middle of May.

There is good reason for praising the new Tigers, however. Those who ride along with George Moriarty's club will get a run for their money and a first division run at that.

Harry Mellmann received 16 votes as the American league's most valuable player of 1926. Henry Hanush received the same number; Bob Fothergill, 6.

This indicates how highly Detroit's outfield was rated last year.
