

Liquor Odor Ample Closure Evidence

CHICAGO, March 31, (U.N.)—Cabarets and night clubs have received their second severe blow in recent months with the decision of the United States circuit court of appeals that smelling liquor in an establishment where ginger ale and cracked ice are sold, are sufficient grounds to close the place.

The rule means that federal agents will not have to go to the trouble of buying liquor to prove a violation for "sniffing raids" will suffice and it matters not whether the liquor is in the possession of proprietor or customer.

But the cabarets directly affected by the decision propose to take their case to the United States supreme court and Judge Samuel A. Schuler, who filed a dissenting opinion, would like to see the matter go to the highest court and settled once and for all time.

Some time ago the Moulin Rouge, Friars Inn and Al Tierney's Town club were visited by prohibition agents. They say ginger ale and cracked ice, and later testified they smelled liquor. Federal Judge Adam J. Cliffe ordered the places padlocked for a year. Defense attorneys appealed.

Judges George E. Page and A. R. Anderson of the circuit court of appeals held that the spirit of the law had been violated.

Squires is Named New A.B.C. Manager

L. J. Squires has been appointed manager of the A.B.C. washer branch here by the Electric Service company of Portland. R. V. Spencer, manager for southern Oregon, who has been here for several months lining up the territory, will leave soon for Medford, where he expects to make his headquarters.

The company opened its store in Medford last week and in Bend the week before that, making three stores in southern Oregon. A large shipment of A.B.C. washers has been received in Klamath Falls in preparation for the spring drive which opens in April.

Students Ousted from University

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, March 31.—(Special)—Fifty-three students were expelled from the University for failure to meet the minimum scholastic standards during the winter term. Carlton E. Spencer, registrar, announced today. Of this number 49 were men and four were women.

The number of flunkers is comparatively small, Mr. Spencer said, because of the probation system under which poor students are given a second chance. The personnel committee gives special attention to weak students, and many are warned in time to improve their work or else withdraw before the end of the term, he explained.

Last fall term 72 were flunked out, and in the winter term of last year 41. The number on probation this fall was 120, and it is expected this number will be smaller for the spring term which has just started.

\$100,000 Children For White Family

LOS ANGELES, March 31, (U.N.)—A pre-nuptial agreement by which J. F. White promised to pay his wife \$100,000 for every child born of their union, was revealed here today when White filed answer to an income tax suit for \$251,120.

White, a British subject of Tampico, Mexico, is resisting efforts of the government to collect taxes said to be due on Los Angeles property.

Two children have been born to the Whites, the Tampico man said in his affidavits. He formed a Los Angeles corporation valued at \$200,000 in the name of his wife, who is American born, to make good his agreement, he asserted. White said he had no earnings in this country.

COLLEGE HEAD LOSES HEALTH; QUILTS JOB

NEW YORK, March 31, (U.N.)—The resignation of Dr. Sidney Edward Mezes, president of the college of the city of New York since 1914, has been accepted by the board of trustees, it was announced today, and Dr. Frederick B. Robinson has been elected to succeed him.

Dr. Mezes has been living in retirement in Italy since last June, trying to rebuild the health he lost in the service of the New York institution.
