Hornsby's Stock Disposal is Real Problem for Heads

NEW YORK, April 5. (U. N.)—The mathematically minded moguls of the National league are about to put their heads together over a new problem in high finance—involving the sum of \$35,010 and the good name of the national pastime.

By a coincidence \$35,010 represents the difference between what Rogers Hornsby paid for some stock in the St. Louis Cardinals and what Sam Breadon wishes to pay him for it, and \$25,010 represents the difference between Breadon's offer and the "raish's" demands.

If something is not done about it before April 12, the National league will seek to prevent Hornsby from playing with the Giants on the ground that his retention of St. Louis stock would leave organized baseball open to the charge of syndication.

GOLDEN BEARS ARE BEATEN BY TROJANS

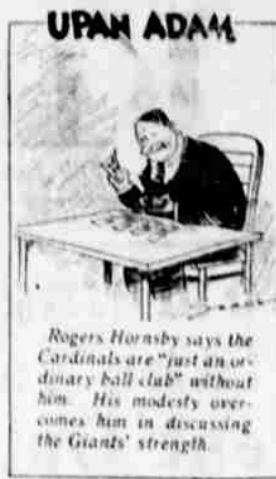
