

Governor Pleads For Passage of Income Tax Law

THE DALLIES, April 7, (U.P.)—Governor J. L. Patterson urged the passage of the proposed income tax law as passed by the last legislature, in a speech before the Klamath club here today.

The needs of the state financially and the necessity of putting the state of Oregon on a sound financial footing were stressed by the governor. He warned the people that nuisance taxes might be in the offing if the income tax fails, but stated that he believed the soundness and justice of the new law, with its low rate would meet the approval of the people in general.

Governor Patterson, with Sam Koser and Thomas H. Kay, other members of the state board of control, was in the Dallis today, looking over the site for the new tuberculosis hospital to be constructed here. The officials expressed themselves as highly pleased with the \$15,000 site which the city of the Dallis has presented to the state.

Lumber Schooner Towed Into Port

PORTLAND, April 7, (U.P.)—The steam schooner Necanicum, which left here April 3 for San Francisco, is in tow of the steamer Challa, off Coos Bay, according to a radio message received Thursday afternoon by the Federal marine station here.

The schooner is leaking badly, it was reported and was forced to jettison a deckload of lumber to avoid swamping. The message, sent by Captain Neilson of the steamer Doyleston, reads:

"The steam schooner Doyleston found the steam schooner Necanicum in tow of the steamer Challa Thursday. Her rudder is broken and she is leaking badly. The pumps were unable to keep the vessel afloat. The crew of the Necanicum let go a deckload of lumber and the vessel is proceeding slowly to San Francisco in tow of the Challa."

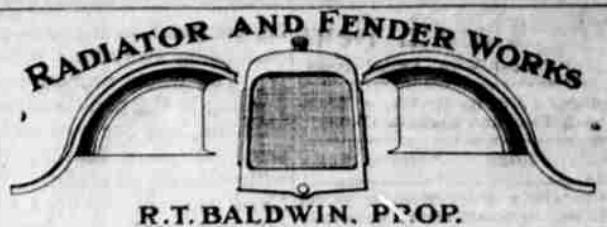


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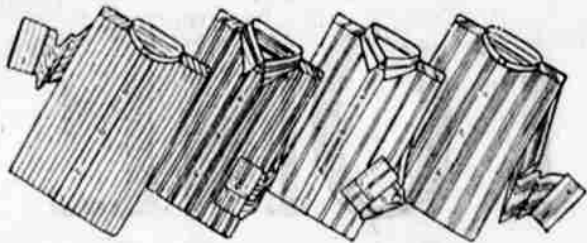
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
