**Marion County is
Asked for Payment**

SALEM, April 8. (U.P.)—Secretary of State Kozor Friday made formal demand for repayment of \$24,459.41 of the money received by Marion county from the Oregon and California land grant refund. The demand, which was addressed to the county judge, commissioner, clerk and treasurer of Marion county, is said to be the forerunner of what probably will develop into a mandamus proceeding to compel the payment of the sum, or at least to test the validity of the state's claim.

Marion county commissioners have declared that they will not pay the sum except by court order. The action, if any, would affect 15 counties.

The state claims \$1,349,391 of the refund amount.

CHICAGO, April 9. (U.P.)—The Illinois A. C. won the team championships in the national men's indoor A. A. U. swimming championships here, scoring 42 points during the week of competition.

Johnny Weismuller of the Illinois A. C., world's premier freestyle swimmer, broke another record, winning the 500 yard free style in five minutes 28 2-5 seconds. The former record for a 500 foot pool was five minutes 32 2-5 seconds.

Farm Outlook Good—"I look for the best agricultural year Nevada has ever had," Peter Hendrichs of Lyons county, Nev., said in a communication received here. "Farmers are optimistic as the water outlook is the best it has been for years," the letter said.

Failed in Peppermint—Lack of interest rather than profits caused the peppermint industry in Klamath to drop out of the farm race, according to John Siemens in a recent statement in Portland. "The industry had much promise when started in Klamath, and could have been developed successfully," Mr. Siemens said. The Willamette valley has since taken it up and is operating in good shape.

Air Mail on Trains—When mail planes are forced down between Portland and San Francisco, any Southern Pacific train that comes along is authorized to pick up the mail and carry it to its destination. J. J. Miller, district agent for the company here, stated Saturday. Word of this reached here in special instructions Saturday, from headquarters.

Langell Ranchers Here—T. P. and Lester Boggs, well known ranchers of the Langell Valley district, were in town on business Friday. They reported that the Horse-

fly reservoir is as full as the government officials wish to have it, and that a heavy flow of water is being released. In addition to this store of irrigation water, there is two feet of snow in the Barnes Valley mountain district which will all drain into the reservoir.
