

Major Leagues Go To the Bat Today For a Record Run

NEW YORK, April 11, (U.P.)—Bringing their coats of tan to the still bleak ball park of the two major league circuits, baseball's greatest will open the 1927 season Tuesday beneath lowering skies.

Some quarter of a million fans will be casting anxious glances toward threatening clouds, since the forecast is for rain in several big league cities.

Weather permitting, the old familiar roar that accompanies the first flash of a new white baseball down "the groove" will salute the season's start from Boston to St. Louis at 2:30 p.m. sharp.

The booming cheer which rises in a crescendo of joy if the pitch is a strike, sinks to a growl of malediction if the ball misses the plate, or breaks off into excited yells if the batter clouts one, is like the throaty cry of "they're off" which signals the springing of the barrier in a classic race.

This year all signs point to both baseball pennant races fulfilling the hopes which the nation's fans put into that opening salute.

It is baseball tradition that a club's most highly prized pitcher shall have the honor of working the opening game of the season. Sometimes sentiment takes a hand in deciding who shall pitch, and sometimes fate.

Walter Johnson would have been selected to take the mound for the Washington Senators, but a broken ankle bone will force the "big train" to watch from the side lines, while another oldtimer, Stan Coveleski, works in his place.

After remaining a hold-out during a considerable part of the spring training season, Herb Pennock deprived himself of the pleasure of flinging in the opener for the New York Yanks. Waite Hoyt gets the call to start against the Athletics.

This year, eight famous pitchers to whom opening game duty is an old story, will be called upon once more to start the season. Two of them, William Bryan Harris and Grover Cleveland Alexander, will be in different uniforms.

Harris, who pitched the opener for the Athletics in 1926, will pitch for the Boston Red Sox, against the Senators. Alexander, with the Cubs at the start of last season, and at that time rated their most valuable pitcher, opens in Chicago Tuesday afternoon, but in the uniform of the world's champions, St. Louis Cardinals.

The seven pitchers who again have been honored by being named to work Tuesday are: Uhle, Cleveland; Whitehill, Detroit; Virgil Barnes of the Giants; Carlson of the Phillies; Vance of the Dodgers; Kremer of Pittsburgh and Pete Donahue of Cincinnati.

In 1926, cold weather right around both circuits failed to keep fans from the ball parks, 223,000 turning out for the eight opening games. This was 19,000 less than the record established the previous year.

This year it seems likely that the weather for the opening day will be even more inclement. The forecast in several cities is: warmer, probable rain. Upon none of the eight cities where the annual baseball drama is to be unfolded, is the sun expected to shine.

The demand for opening game tickets, however, is such that if rain does not interfere all attendance records for opening day are about to be smashed.

Hornsby Case is Equably Settled

NEW YORK, April 11, (U.P.)—Coming out of a last minute huddle called to prevent the threatened recourse to the civil courts, the interested parties announced today that the "Hornsby case" had been settled to the satisfaction of all concerned.

In making the announcement after an early morning gathering in the offices of the New York Giants, John A. Heydler, president of the National league, said that an agreement had been reached for the purchase of Hornsby's stock in the St. Louis club, and that the stock would revert to Sam Breadon, president, and majority stockholder of the St. Louis club.

It was agreed, according to Heydler, in a meeting attended by representatives of the New York club, the league and Hornsby and his attorney that the terms of the settlement would not be made public. It is estimated, however, that Hornsby was given \$116,000 for the 1167 shares of stock that he owns in the St. Louis club.
