

New Time Tables For Cascade Line Are Nearly Ready

Time tables for the new Cascade route will be received by the local office of the Southern Pacific Thursday or Friday, it was announced Tuesday.

Four regular passenger trains will run over the new line, one a through train from Los Angeles to Portland, one local train, the crack Cascade limited, comparable to the finest trains in the country, and the coach special, a 24 1/2 hour train between San Francisco and Portland. Schedules for the local and the through train from Los Angeles have not as yet been announced, as some revisions have been made since the first announcement.

The schedules for the Cascade limited and the coach special follow. The hours at which the trains arrive here are approximate, but accurate within a few minutes either way, according to local officials:

Cascade limited, southbound, leave Portland 10:05 p. m., beginning Sunday night. Arrive Klamath Falls, 5 a. m. Arrive San Francisco, 9:25 p. m.

Northbound, leave San Francisco 4:40 p. m. Arrive Klamath Falls 6:20 a. m. Arrive Portland, 4:05 p. m.

Coach special, southbound, leave Portland 10:30 a. m. Tuesdays and Fridays. Arrive Klamath Falls 6:30 p. m. Arrive San Francisco, 11:00 a. m.

Northbound, leave San Francisco 3:00 p. m. Wednesdays and Saturdays. Arrive Klamath Falls 4:30 a. m. Arrive Portland 3:30 p. m.

A special fare for all points in Oregon as far south as Chiloquin to San Francisco has been made, with \$15 for one way and \$30 for round trip tickets, applicable only to the coach train.

On the Cascade, a special fare of \$1.50 is charged.

Bond Issue Sold To Portland Firm

Freeman, Smith and Camp company, Portland was the successful bidder on the \$142,700 bond issue to refund outstanding indebtedness. It was revealed at the meeting of the county court Monday. The company's bid was \$143,907, making a premium of \$1,207, and the bonds are to bear 4 1/2% interest.

Blyth-Witter company and Seawood Mayer, both of Portland, were second and third respectively. Bids making a premium of as high as \$2000 were among the nine opened, but the court accepted the Freeman, Smith and Camp bid because the rate of interest over a 20-year period more than made up the difference.

The chambers of commerce of Chiloquin and Fort Klamath appeared before the court, and petitioned to have the road from Chiloquin to the Agency. The Chiloquin residents also asked that the court repair the county road from the end of the market road to the mill of the Forest Lumber company. Both matters were referred to the county engineer.

Students Join in Fight for Rebels

BOSTON, April 12, (U.P.)—The battle to save Nicolai Sacco and Bartolomeo Vanzetti from the electric chair in July, on Tuesday assumed the form of a barrage of letters, cablegrams and telegrams pouring into the office of Governor Alvin T. Fuller, urging clemency.

In the flood of protests was a petition signed by 293 Wellesley students, expressing the hope that "It is not too late for them to receive justice."

Representative Roland D. Sawyer introduced in the Massachusetts house of representatives a resolution calling for the appointment of a commission of five to study the evidence in the case and report its findings to Governor Fuller.

SHEVLIN-HIXON GETS MORE TIMBER HERE

Two small purchases of timber have been made in northeastern Klamath county by the Shevlin-Hixon company.

The company acquired 50 acres from H. A. Utley, of the Pavell-Utley company, Lakeview, and 160 acres from Thora K. and William Foss.

Three hundred and twenty acres which were deeded to Shevlin-Hixon by the Weyerhaeuser Timber company simply as a matter of exchange to group the holdings of the two firms, according to Jack Kimball, representative of the Weyerhaeuser interests. For the past few months, small tracks have been exchanged by the two lumber companies, Kimball said, simply to group their holdings as much as possible.

Bandits Disguised As Cops Make Haul

LOS ANGELES, April 12, (U.P.)—Pretending to be police officers, two bandits Tuesday forced their way into the home of Mrs. J. M. Cummins, held up a gathering of society women, locked their victims in a clothes closet and escaped with jewelry and cash valued at \$15,000.

Mrs. Ted Rice and Mrs. George W. Carrie, of San Francisco were included among the victims. Both were robbed of diamonds and money.

The women were driven into a bedroom, one at a time, and relieved of their jewels. When the bandits gathered in all their loot, five of the women were locked in a clothes closet while the sixth remained outside on her promise not to release the prisoners until the bandits had been gone 15 minutes.

Mrs. Cummins, hostess, suffered the greatest loss. She estimated the value of her stolen gems at \$10,000.

More Homes Broken Up Than are Made

DENVER, April 12, (U.P.)—Homes are being broken up faster than they are being established in Denver, according to statistics compiled by the juvenile court.

During the last 12 months, the report shows, 3,948 homes were broken up through divorce, separate maintenance and annulment of marriage suits. For the same period 2,744 marriage licenses were issued.

Trouble Brewing Within Councils Of Nationalists

SHANGHAI, April 12, (U.P.)—While native police counted 12 dead in the native city as the result of raids against the extremist, the nationalist party Tuesday night prepared for a bitter fight within its own councils.

Quo Tai Chi, nationalist commissioner, declared a fight to the finish against extremists within his own party. Reports of nationalist advances in the direction of the Yangtze river were confirmed, and it was admitted that the nationalist party was facing a crisis when their executive session was held in Nanking Wednesday.

Effects of unrest within the party were felt in Shanghai and foreigners feared a general strike was threatened.

Fifteen armed laborers were killed in Monday night's raids, which were made in search of radical literature in the native quarter. One nationalist soldier was killed. The raids were made upon direction of Bei Chung Hsi, moderate nationalist leader, and among those arrested was the chairman of the Shanghai labor union. A mass meeting of protest ended in a parade to labor headquarters, to discuss the progress of the strike.

While nationalist headquarters ridiculed reports of deaths at the hands of advancing northerners in the vicinity of Chikiang, natives in the Chinese district began to prepare for a possible northern victory.

The postoffice was the first building to appear without its national flag. When the officials at that building furled the national banner, other Chinese in the city were quick to follow this action.

Apprehension among foreigners in the Shanghai settlements increased as it became increasingly probable that Shanghai might have to face a second capture, this time by the northern troops, with in a few weeks' time.

Lake County Water Users Fight Raise

The West Side Water Users association in meeting Friday evening protested an increase in maintenance charges under the Goose Lake Valley Irrigation company's canals. Statements sent out last month indicate an increase from the former charge of \$1.00 per acre to \$1.50.

Members of the association state that the increase came without warning and with no statement of the plans of the company with respect to an improvement of the service. Members appear not unwilling to pay the higher charge if they are given an improvement in the service, though they believe the increase not justified on the basis of past service.

A resolution to withhold payment of the charges until the matter could be taken up with the company was passed. Advised of the protest, it is understood that the problem will be taken up by directors of the company at headquarters in Minneapolis.—Lakeview Examiner.
