

Woman Stabs Self After Killing Son

KANSAS CITY, Mo., April 13. (U.P.)—Mrs. Margaret Langsdale, wife of John M. Langsdale Jr., prominent Kansas City attorney, late today killed her eight-year old son, John Langsdale III, with a hammer and a butcher knife and then committed suicide by slitting her own throat.

The murder and suicide occurred in the Langsdale home.

Mrs. Langsdale who had been suffering from a mental affliction for some months was apparently obsessed with an idea the boy had disobeyed her.

A few minutes before the tragedy occurred, the maid heard sounds of a struggle in the stairs. She called Harry Bartlett, a delivery boy, and the two went up to investigate.

As they rushed upstairs they heard him screaming:

"Don't let mother kill me, don't let mother kill me," came the cries.

When Bartlett reached the room he found the boy with his head crushed and his throat cut. Close by lay the body of his mother, her throat cut, and beside her a bloody hammer and butcher knife.

The boy's toys were scattered about the room around the bodies just as he had left them a short while before.

Mitchell is Named Head of Hatcheries

PORTLAND, April 13. (U.P.)—The office of master fish warden for Oregon was declared vacant and the resignation of Superintendent of hatcheries was accepted at the regular monthly meeting of the fish commission here.

Hugh C. Mitchell was named superintendent of hatcheries following the resignation of R. E. Clanton, who plans to enter private business.

M. T. Toy will handle the affairs of the master fish warden until the commission can give consideration to application on file.

John C. Veatch was elected chairman of the commission.

A. W. Franklin, who has acted as master fish warden for three months will assist Toy for a time and was granted 60 days salary.

California's New Divorce Plan Dead

SACRAMENTO, April 13. (U.P.)—An attempt to make California divorces final and immediate has failed in the state legislature.

Assemblyman George W. Rochester's bill which would have abolished interlocutory decrees and done away with the necessity of a year's wait before divorced persons could remarry was defeated in the assembly today by a vote of 52 to 20.

Rochester opened arguments for his measure in the midst of good natured jeering from the assembly floor. He declared that by making divorce decrees final the state would do away with a good deal of illicit love making which he declared exists under the present system.

Search Made for Aviator Smuggler

LOS ANGELES, April 13. (U.P.)—Jack Knight, asserted world war aviator and more recently mentioned as "flight commander" of an airplane squadron engaged in smuggling Chinese into the United States was made the object of a nationwide search tonight.

Knight was arrested near Murietta Hot Springs several weeks ago, when his plane was forced to land because of engine trouble. Four Chinese were crowded in the cockpit, according to officers who made the arrest.

He was pronounced a fugitive from justice when he failed to appear to enter plea in federal court. Two other members of the air smuggling ring, together with the four orientals, pleaded guilty.

Health Officials to Visit Valley

Dr. J. G. Townsend, in charge of the northwest Indian bureau of the government department of public health, and Dr. Frederick Stricker, head of the state health department, left Wednesday afternoon for Grants Pass.

While here they conferred with Dr. G. S. Newson, head of the county health unit, on the matter of cooperation between state, county, and government departments in Indian work. Dr. Townsend will go from Grants Pass to the Cooper reservation, near Eureka, Calif.

Woman Driver Will Face Murder Charge

LOS ANGELES, April 13. (U.P.)—A warrant charging manslaughter has been issued here for arrest of Mrs. Louise Porter, wealthy Denver clubwoman.

The warrant was issued on complaint of B. Y. Duke, whose wife died from injuries received in a head-on automobile collision, in which a car owned by Mrs. Porter was a factor.

According to the complaint, Mrs. Porter's car, driven by a negro chauffeur, was traveling at an excessive rate of speed when it crashed into a light sedan, in which Mr. and Mrs. Duke were riding.

Suits for \$4,000 personal damages and \$50,000 of his wife's estate have been entered by Duke.

Mrs. Porter and others are named defendants.

Marie Davis was granted a decree dissolving the bonds of matrimony between her and Lorene Davis by Judge Leavitt in circuit court Wednesday.

Custody of their child, Alan, Jr., was given to Mrs. Crosland in agreement, out of court, it was intimated.

Crosland has directed three pictures starring John Barrymore, including "The Beloved Rogue," just released. Alan Jr., made a screen appearance under his father in his production of Elinor Glyn's "Three Weeks."
