1/2 cup Crisco
2 1/2 cups sugar
1 egg
1 teaspoon vanilla
1/2 teaspoon salt

1 cup chopped raisins
1 cup chopped walnuts

3/4 cup pastry flour
2 teaspoons baking powder

Press Censorship In China Charged

WASHINGTON, April 15. (U.P.)—Rear Admiral W. H. Bullard, retired, who has just returned from China to be head of the federal radio commission, discussed the Chinese situation with the president today, stating that it appears that Great Britain was censoring press dispatches out of China.

"I don't like to charge Great Britain with censorship, but that appears to be what is happening," the admiral said. "The men who write the dispatches would not recognize them as they appear in American newspapers."

State department officials were at a loss to know what Bullard meant by this charge. So far as is known here, American press correspondents are under no British restriction. Official dispatches to this government are not censored by the British. It was pointed out. Some thought that possibly the admiral referred to the situation whereby one American press association, not the United Press, is partially dependent upon news furnished to it by Reuters, the British agency. This would not apply to American news dispatches generally, but only to those of the one agency which has a working agreement with the British concern.

Indians Prepare For Easter With Barbarous Rites

SANTA FE, N. M., April 15. (U.P.)—Self tortured into exhaustion by lashing themselves with whips and treading cactus strewn paths in their bare feet, members of the Los Hornos, penitentes, flagellant religious sect, have prepared for the celebration of Easter.

The annual pre-Easter rites of the sect, with mock crucifixions in their native American passion play, were concluded Friday only after the last member had fallen from pain and exhaustion.

The novitiate began Thursday night in a darkened building back in the hills, with younger members dragging heavy chains across the floor to resemble thunder while older members raised their voices above the din to chant their native prayers.

At dawn began the tortures, said to have been handed down from the 16th century monks who practiced self punishment to expiate their sins.

Cries of pain mingled with weird incantations as the members lashed their backs with thong whips and the cactus thorns pierced their feet. Crowns of thorns brought blood streaming from the brows of the natives. To maddening tom-toms the weird ceremony continued until all participants fell exhausted.

Members of the sect live along the Rio Grande river in remote sections of New Mexico and southern Colorado. In some of the outlying villages an "El Christo" bears a cross to a hillside Calvary. Natives tie him to the cross and he hangs there in expiation of the sins of his order until the ceremony is completed.

Dodge's Wife Will Return to States

HONOLULU, April 15. (U.P.)—While Horace Dodge, Detroit millionaire, continues his mysterious journey about Hawaii, his wife, who instituted divorce proceedings last January, plans to sail for the mainland Saturday.

Mrs. Dodge, still begging to be excused from lengthy interviews because of ill health, asserted Friday upon her return from Hilo that there was no chance of a reconciliation with her husband.

At the same time she said that she had engaged passage on the liner President Madison, for San Francisco.

Dodge, who was unsuccessful in an attempt to conceal his identity on a trip from California, has gone to the island of Maui, and it was understood that he may not return here.

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Railroad Receiver Sees Development

KANSAS CITY, Mo., April 15. (U.P.)—The spectacle of an optimistic railroad receiver testifying to good times ahead was presented today at the interstate commerce commission freight rates hearing here.

H. E. Byram, Chicago co-receiver and former president of the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul railway said he looked forward to development in the northwest that would make all this section of the country prosperous.

Byram testified principally to the poor financial condition of his road, which is about to emerge from receivership. "These conditions," he said, were due to inadequate freight rates. Notwithstanding this condition, he said, the northwest is developing and ten or twelve years would see the development of new fortunes.
