Oregon High Relay Meet Prepared For

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, April 18.—(Special)—Plans for the first annual Oregon high school relay meet to be staged here April 23, under the supervision of the university are nearly complete, according to Bill Hayward, track coach. More than 40 schools are expected to take part in the tourney.

Ten events have been scheduled for the championships, six of them relays and four special events for individuals. Approximately 200 men will take part. Each of the special events, for which medals will be awarded the winner and second and third place men, will have an entry list of about 25 athletes.

Several silver loving cups have been offered the winning teams of the relay events and medals will be given to individuals composing teams which place. Arrangements have been made for a 220-yard straightaway with nine available lanes to prevent congestion in running off events.

Negro Bootlegger King Gets 20 Years

PORTLAND, April 18. (U.P.)—John Lowe, king of colored bootleggers and a power in the underworld, was sentenced to serve 20 years in the state penitentiary by Circuit Judge Ekwall.

Lowe was accused of instigating the robbery of Birdie's roadhouse, in December, 1926. Although he was not an actual participant in the holdup Lowe was convicted on the testimony of the two men who committed the crime. They turned state witnesses and told of how they had fallen under the influence of Lowe, how he had planned the holdup and how it was perpetrated.

Lowe's attorney pleaded for leniency, but Judge Ekwall refused to heed the plea.

SPORT FLASHES

BALTIMORE, Md., April 18. (U.P.)—The Satrap, three-year old son of the celebrated English sire The Tetrarch, for which William Dupont Jr., paid \$100,000, has broke down in training and may never race again, Max Hirsch, his trainer, said today.

Hirsch said he had a weak fetlock which could not be corrected. The three-year old, even if able to race, would not be a total loss, as he was purchased primarily for the stud.

BURLINGAME, Calif., April 18. (U.P.)—Willie Hunter, defending champion and former titled holder, finished the halfway of the 72-hole tournament play two strokes in front of his nearest competitor, opening the way for his retaining California's premier golfing honors when the final 36 holes are played off tomorrow.

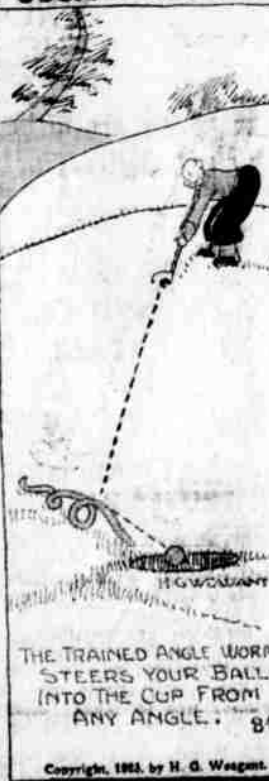

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Pitching, Batting Thrills Feature In Monday Games

Several brilliant pitching exhibitions and one slugging one, replete with extra innings thrills, featured Monday's major league games.

"Old Dutch" Reuther pitched the Yankees to their sixth consecutive victory of the season and sent the Red Sox down to their sixth straight defeat, 3 to 0. It was also Reuther's second winning effort.

Holls Thurston, obtained by the Senators from Chicago in a winter trade, turned in his second well pitched victory of the season, blanketing the Athletics, 4 to 0. Washing-

ton made all its runs off Walberg in the first inning.

Lee Meadows, Pittsburgh's spectacular pitching "ace," also delivered his second victory, holding the Cubs to four hits while the Pirates were hitting out a 9 to 1 triumph. Chicago's only run came as the result of a homer by Gabby Hartnett in the third.

Home runs by Schatz and Gascon enabled the Browns to nose out a victory over the White Sox, 5 to 4. The Indians stemmed a ninth inning rally and beat the Tigers, 3 to 2.

As exciting a game as the most ardent fan could wish was played in Boston, where the Giants retained their position in the van of the National league parade by finally defeating the Braves, 11 to 10. With New York leading, eight runs

to two, the home team staged a six run rally in the 7th. The Giants got a run in the ninth and so did the Braves. Both scored once in the tenth. Finally the Giants put over another in the eleventh and Boston couldn't match it. Thirty-four hits were made during the game.

The Brooklyn Robins continued to lose, dropping another to the Phillies, 7 to 3. Williams of the winners, and "Irish" Meusel of the Robins, hit homers.
