Sherdel allowed the visitors five hits and the Cards won 4 to 2.

University Given Big Appropriation

EUGENE, Ore., April 20, (U. P.)—Appropriation of \$120,000 for the University of Oregon medical school by the general education board of New York City was announced today at the office of President Arnold Bennett Hall.

The information from New York was accompanied by a check for \$50,000, the first installment of the appropriation. Richard Blumenthal, dean of the medical school, and President Hall, issued a statement in which they said the action of the New York board comes as an encouraging recognition of the scholastic and medical standing of the medical school.

The appropriation makes the total gifts received by the University of Oregon during the past seven months well over a million dollars.
