

### Indian Relics Are Given to Library

The first contribution of Indian relics to the new public library in response to the call sent out some time ago has been made. Mrs. L. O. Mills of Hot Springs addition sent in six specimens of rock work which she and her husband have picked up in this neighborhood.

These pieces, together with a number of others formerly donated by Capt. O. C. Applegate and which were on exhibit in the old library building, will form the nucleus of what it is hoped will become a large and representative display of relics of an early civilization here. It is believed that the collection will be of great interest to tourists and others visiting the city.

Some weeks ago the Chamber of Commerce appointed director Bert C. Thomas and Capt. Applegate as a committee to work for the collection of as perfect and representative a showing of these antiquities as possible.

It is hoped that everyone having relics of this nature which they should like either to give or to loan to the library for display will communicate with the committee.

### NEW GOLD STRIKE MADE IN ARIZONA

YUMA, Ariz., April 20. (U.P.)—Jim McDonald, veteran Nevada and Arizona prospector arrived in Yuma Wednesday night with 500 pounds of sample rock of high grade gold.

McDonald states the ore came from a claim between the old King of Arizona and North Star mines, both of which have paid several million dollars, but which are now inactive.

The scene of McDonald's strike is in an almost inaccessible mountain region, 70 miles from here.

### Thousands Flee as Levees Are Broken

MEMPHIS, Tenn., April 20. (U.P.)—Additional thousands were fleeing before the onrushing Mississippi today as the roaring river continued to sweep over the St. Francis basin, cascading over and pounding through levees in the greatest southwest flood since the turn of the century.

The hitherto unconquerable levees, centering around New Madrid, Mo., were being smashed and complete inundation of the valley appeared certain because all levees protecting the basin from the Mississippi have been broken by the savage force of the swollen river.

Scores of towns are under water. Rowboats and improvised rafts are being used where, before, automobiles and trains sped over concrete roadbeds and tracks. A few hardy residents have remained in the flooded districts, but are living in the attics of their houses, story deep in water.

About 40,000 persons already have fled to higher, more secure ground. The Red Cross has characterized the flood as a major disaster and relief work is being rapidly organized to care for the destitute.

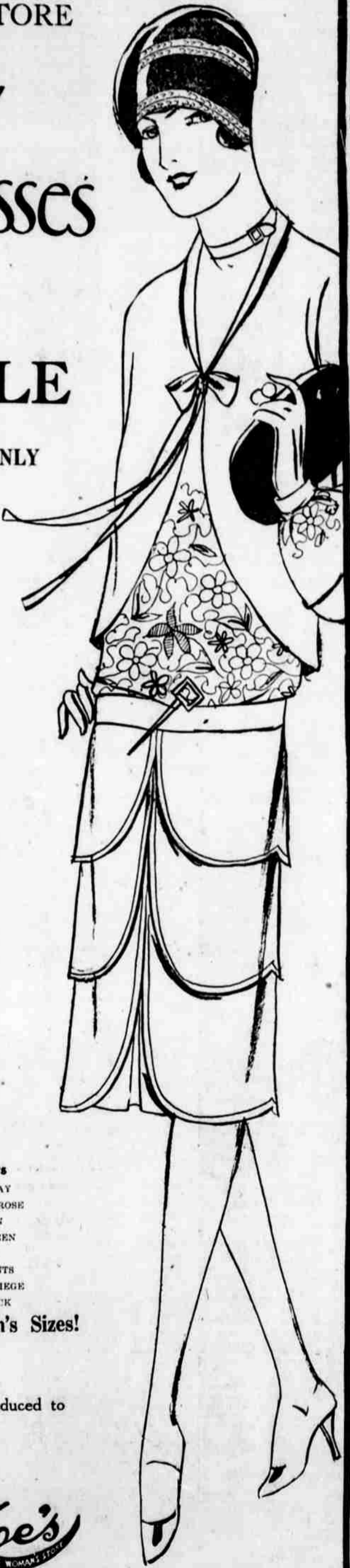
