W. C. Van Emon is captain of the Kiwanians, and is aided by J. Fred Glover, manager, Elmer Balzinger, W. W. Southwell, Tom Delsell, Johnny Houston and a few other hard hitters are planning a series of signals, and fast tosses.

## International Polo Games In July

NEW YORK, April 21, (U. P.)—Polo, swiftest of sports, combining the merits of ice hockey, lacrosse and horse-racing with the thrills of a rodeo, returns to its own this season.

Dates have been set for the ninth of a series of international matches between America and England.

An English team will ride in quest of the international cup which was carried away from Ranelagh by a quartet of upstarts, some years ago, the meetings in 1927 being fixed for September 5 and 10.

It is three years since we have had first class international polo. In 1924, when the Prince of Wales was here, England sent a team in quest of the famous trophy, but it stayed in the United States by a margin of many goals. This year, the British will try again.

One thing significant is the tremendous demand for boxes and seats for the international matches months in advance of the proceedings. Long before it was decided when the matches would be held, the orders for seats had exceeded anything previously experienced by those in charge of polo in this country.

Polo has been a rich man's sport heretofore, but in this year of grace we find no end of rich men. One of the most important phases of polo is the mount. This year the Harry Payne Whitney stables at Wheatley Hills will be used for the American international polo pony string which will include 45 or 50 mounts.

"Trial matches" to decide the make-up of the American team which will defend the international trophy will start July 1. The following players have been invited to participate:

NEW YORK, April 21, (U. P.)—Rogers Hornsby, who, besides being an able stock salesman and captain of the New York Giants, apparently is untroubled by superstition, recently predicted that his team-mates would win 18 out of their first 22 games and show a clean pair of heels to their National league rivals.

The same day that "Rajah" made his prediction, the Phillies took a terrible fall out of the Giants.

Establishing an average of more than .500, as the New York Yankees did in the American league for a time last season, is no mean feat. It is improbable that the Giants will be able to fulfill their captain's boast.

However, the Giants have shown a penchant for slugging which bodes ill for their prospective opponents. But more than this, John J. McGraw, who already is figuring upon celebrating his silver jubilee year with another pennant, is looking forward to adding two tremendously powerful cogs to his already able machine.

Travis Jackson, star shortstop, who was stricken with appendicitis on the eve of opening day, has promised to report at the Polo Grounds this week. It is, of course, highly improbable that Jackson will be allowed to don a uniform this soon after his operation, but his return will make the New York infield look as strong as any now functioning in the National league.

## Eddie Roberts of Tacoma, Wash. Now Going Down

NEW YORK, April 21, (U. P.)—The case of Eddie Roberts of Tacoma is one far from uncommon in boxing.

There is, in fact, a moral for both boxers and managers in what happened to the handsome young Washington welterweight.

Eddie stepped to fame in a single round and passed as abruptly to that state of mediocrity from which so few ever return.

It is less than five months since young Roberts stopped Joe Dundee in the first round of their battle on the coast. Since that time, Eddie has been out-boxed by old-timers, whipped by the man over whose prostrate form he strode to fistic prominence, and finally knocked cold in one round by a second rate welterweight up in Boston.

All because those who wanted to make money from the boy's sudden ascent to fame rushed him along much too fast. They were determined that he must be a headliner in all his bouts, for headliners get the money.

To be a headliner, Roberts had to meet some tough opponents. He was not in the position of a champion and able to pick soft spots. He was a great drawing card, but his opponents had to be fighters of some prominence.

The pace was too fast for Eddie. The wise old fighters who were pitted against him took his number and beat him up. Also, it was said, the rush of publicity turned Robert's head and led him into trouble.

If Eddie had been coaxed along, provided with suitable second-rate opponents and given a chance to develop gradually toward the peak of his fighting form, he might have gone far—might even have become middleweight champion. He would have been too heavy for the welterweight division by the time he reached the heights.

Al Mello, Boston southpaw, laid Roberts low in the first round of their recent fight with a sock on the Adam's apple, no pleasant place to be hit. Eddie recovered after being counted out, but his reputation as a coming top-notch and a box office attraction was gone.

The flat of his back, has promised McGraw to be on hand by mid-summer. The addition of this ruthless ball player would make the Giants a much better bet than they have been heretofore.

Meanwhile, it is not Hornsby's fault that his team is not fulfilling his optimistic prediction. Of all the most talked of stars of winter, he is playing the best baseball.
