Stanford Reds Win Sensational Track Contest from U.S.C.

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Cal., April 23. (U.P.)—The rambling Reds of Stanford proved the most powerful of two strong track and field teams here this afternoon when they crumpled a 75 to 56 victory over a crippled but fighting outfit of young athletes from University of Southern California.

Stanford's victory makes that California institution a favorite to win in the national intercollegiate championships at Philadelphia next month.

The final event of the day, the mile relay, was the most spectacular in the history of the two teams' competition. The Trojans were in the lead up until the fourth and final lap when Bud Spencer, quarter miler, took the peg from his team mate, Captain Larry Balcock, ten yards behind the Trojan finisher. Spencer outdid himself to such an extent he came home a victor 12 yards in front and enabled the Cards to establish a new Pacific record in the relay event at three minutes 18 4-5 seconds.

NEBRASKA WILDCAT GIVES WELTER K. O.

LOS ANGELES, April 23. (U.P.)—Ace Hudkins, Nebraska wildcat, knocked out Sid Socklyn, Kansas City welterweight in the fourth round of a scheduled 10 round bout here last night.
