Turning in his third brilliant pitching performance of the season, Haines beat the Pirates 1 to 0, allowing but three hits. Ray Kremer, Pittsburgh ace, lost his first game of the year, despite his great hurling, when Taylor Douthett scored the only run with a homer in the sixth inning.

The Phillies moved into the first division, slaughtering three Boston pitchers in a 12 to 4 victory, and the Cincinnati Reds up on a seven run rally in the eighth to beat the Cubs, 11 to 5.

After "Brick" Owens had ordered 19 Washington players from the Yankee stadium for unseemly chatter, the Senators came from behind, aided by Goslin's home run and defeated the Yankees 5 to 4.

Benny Karr held the Browns to four hits, while his mates drove Ballou from the box, Cleveland winning 9 to 1. The White Sox and the Tigers went 10 innings in a free hitting, loose fielding game before Chicago won, 7 to 6.

Lionel Speece, H. Sleep, and R. Edmondson were in Chiloquin on business Monday.

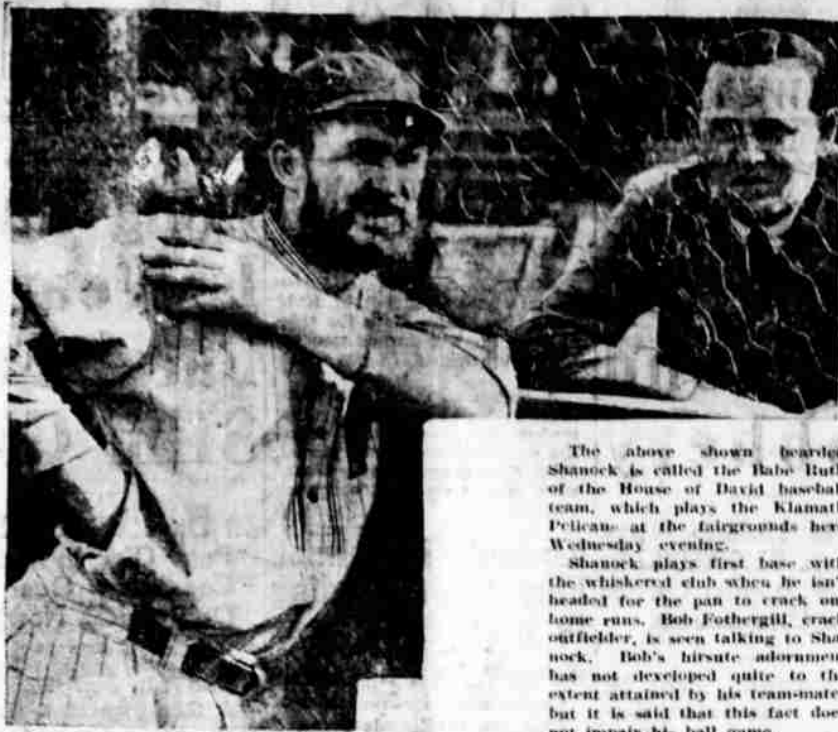

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Ore., April 25.—Five teams, four varsity and a freshman, will be sent to the annual University of Oregon relay carnival to be held at Seattle next Saturday. Although there will be several special individual events, Victor Wetzel of Portland probably will be the only Oregon entrant in the individual events. Wetzel is a weight man and may compete in the discus, shot put and javelin.

Records Smashed At Relay Tourney

MEMORIAL STADIUM, Lawrence, Kan., April 25, (U.P.)—Four meet records succumbed, one world's record was broken but not allowed to stand and another world's record tied as track stars from universities, colleges and high schools from all parts of the United States performed at the fifth annual university of Kansas relay carnival here.

University of Kansas relay team shattered the world record in the half mile university relay event, but the mark was not allowed to stand, because the last man ran with a baton and cut the lanes. The time was 1:26.5.

Meet records to fall, were all classes of the two mile relay and the discus.

Iowa State stepped the university two mile relay in 7:53.9, cutting down the old mark of 7:56.2, while Galesburg, Ill., lowered the old high school two mile relay mark from eight minutes 30 seconds to 8:22.3 and Haskell cut one second from the former college two mile relay mark of eight minutes 5.2 seconds.

Rinefort of Grinnel was credited with the other record hurling the discus 143 feet. The old record was 139 feet 3 inches.

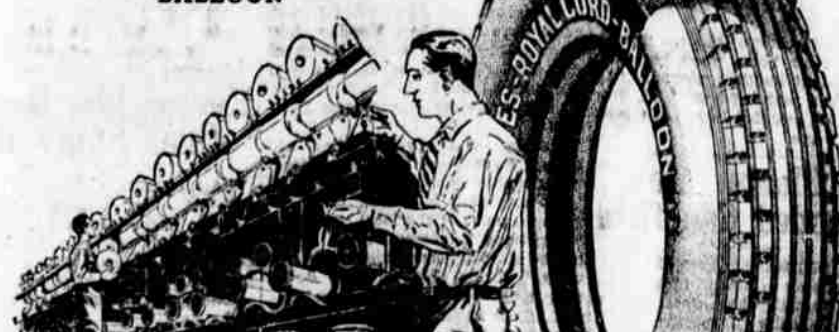
