HOLLYWOOD WINS GAME FROM SEALS

SAN FRANCISCO, April 27, (U. P.)—Shellenback's superb pitching gave Hollywood a 4 to 0 victory over the Seals. The game was played in Los Angeles. Shelly's one hit game was the third of the season. Delaney allowed Sacramento five hits and won for Oakland, 8 to 1, while "Wee" Ludolph gave only five safeties in piloting Mission to a 6 to 3 victory over Los Angeles here.

Portland defeated Seattle 6 to 3 and the Beavers, along with Oakland, passed the Indians in the league standings.

Portland and the Oaks, with records of 15 wins and 14 losses, now are tied for third place, half a game behind San Francisco, which in turn, trails Sacramento by three full games.

Browns Move Into Second Place With 10-Inning Game

The St. Louis Browns moved into second place in the American league Wednesday as the result of a 10-inning victory over the Cleveland Indians, 4 to 2. Sherrod Smith, who had held Sam Jones even in a long pitching duel, weakened in the tenth and the Browns put over two runs. Jones, the former Yankee, allowed the Indians but six hits.

Connie Mack's aged ivory hand took another fall out of the Boston Red Sox, "Lefty" Grove holding the Hub nine to six hits, while Bill Lamar's homer provided the final punch in a 4 to 1 victory.

J. Fred Blake's pitching proved too much for the Reds, who dropped a close game to the Cubs, 2 to 1.

Detroit errors and inability of the Tigers to hit Jacobs and Connolly, enabled the White Sox to climb several notches in the American league race, Chicago pounding four opposing pitchers and winning 7 to 2.

Milo Mallory of San Francisco became the new amateur heavyweight champion when he knocked out William Schultz of Buffalo in the first round.

New York City carried off four championships; Harry Leibenson in the 112 pound class; Tommy Lown in the 147 pound class; Joe Hanlon among the 160 pounders; and George Hoffman in the 175 pound class.

About 6,000 cheering, jeering fight fans who packed the arena saw some thrilling contests, featured by three knockouts.

The Mallory-Schultz fracas was one of the stellar bouts of the night. Schultz fought gamely every inch of the way, until he was knocked out. Any number of times he was down and managed to struggle up again.

Christopher Battine of Hartford displayed real championship qualities when he knocked out Louis New of Milwaukee in the first minute of fighting in the 126 pound final.
