The hanging of the firecrackers turned the meeting into a bedlam and interrupted an address by Prof. Guy Clarke of the science department of the University of California.

The senior class of the school was absent in its annual celebration of pikers' day, but about 300 underclassmen had gathered for the meeting. Suddenly a large firecracker exploded in the rear of the chapel.

Girls screamed and riot reigned as additional explosions sounded all parts of the room.

President C. C. Melrow gained order temporarily and requested that "all who threw firecrackers please leave the chapel."

No one moved. Then he introduced the speaker and Prof. Clark swung into his address and completed it despite a continuous obligate of explosions and other noises.

First Radio Slander Suit Has Been Filed

OAKLAND, Calif., April 26, (U.P.)—California's first radio slander suit has been filed here.

Mayor J. L. Davies, recently elected for fifth term, and Mrs. Ada Aber, operator of the apartment house in which Davies lives, asked \$100,000 each from Commissioner Leroy Goodrich and the broadcasting station from which Goodrich sent out a political speech earlier this month.

"If Mayor Davies is the kind of a man his friends claim him to be," said Goodrich in his speech, according to the complaint, "why does he live at the California apartments and associate with the type of women and bootleggers who are known to live and thrive there?"

This statement, it was alleged, caused "great humiliation and injury to the reputation" of Mayor Davies and Mrs. Aber.
