Wesley Henry of Calhoun, Tex., won on what was called a knock-out Wednesday night when Earl Ritchie of Klamath Falls took a Steve Brooke in the seventh round of the main event of the American Legion boxing program at San Francisco. It was learned here Friday Henry had given Earl a sweet going over in all of the rounds except the second, and in the seventh wanted the Klamath Falls representative of the best fight decided to kiss the floor one minute, 13 seconds after the start of the round.

Henry had planned a left cross to the chin about one minute after the seventh started and then during a lull, and as Henry evidently was about to start another attack, Earl took to the floor, falling on his hands and lying prone on the floor while the referee counted 10.
