WORTH ANSWERS MANY QUESTIONS OF THE VOGUE

"Where are the belts of this season?" "Are the short-waisted effects to replace the longer?" These are the questions that assume importance with every anticipated change in the mode. The assumed importance is, however, wholly in the mind of the woman who asks the question.

The waistline is always an imaginary zone insofar as the mode itself is concerned. To consider it without relation to the entire frock is to think of a single architectural detail, such as a window, without considering the facade, the material, or the period of a home. Proportion in architecture and proportion in the designing of a frock are equally important. The actual details—the waistline, the length of the skirt, the sleeves—are unimportant, except as they conform to the requirements of the whole.

That is, possibly, the great distinction between the couturier and the dressmaker. The dressmaker literally makes a dress. Out of material, detail and a pattern, she makes for her customer a gown that may be modish, smart, and that may embody all the details of the current fashion. But she begins with a pattern, she does not herself create. The waistline is an important matter to her because it is a detail—and the details are what make up her language of the mode. She is interested in the length of the skirt—how many inches from the floor. She pores over the fashion magazines to see whether pleating is popular, whether sleeves shall be short or long, whether skirts are wide or narrow.
