THE GREAT NORTHERN COMES

That the Great Northern railway is to extend its lines into Central Oregon independently, and that the Northern Pacific is to withdraw from the project, is information from the East. With the exception of the time required to work out a few details, the Great Northern is now prepared for actual work on the project.

The announcement means that the Northern road is soon to undertake its part in the development of a vast empire. It means that territory heretofore without railroad facilities is to be provided with transportation, that other territory will have the benefit of competition, that Central Oregon will be drawn closer to Portland and to other markets, and that a region long held back in its development is to be opened and stimulated.

The people of Oregon are to be congratulated on the entrance of the Great Northern into this territory. It is one of those roads whose officers have the courage and the vision to reach into new fields and aid in their development. It does not, like some others, always weigh the prospects for business by the pound and by the ounce before entering new regions. It does not always wait until the business is assured, but, on the other hand, it undertakes its part of the responsibility in developing the business and the country.

three years Hagh was a fugitive, and numerous secret service men, railroad investigators and detectives.

The three brothers were indicted for murder on four counts after suspicion fastened itself on them in 1923. But a separate federal charge was filed, and if Hagh is acquitted he will be tried for attempted train robbery.

Federal authorities surrendered him to the state because conviction in the present case carries the penalty of death, while conviction on the federal charge has a maximum penalty of 25 years in prison.

MEDFORD, April 30, (U.P.)—Subpoenas have been issued for 50 witnesses by the state in the d'Au-tremont trial, but the names and addresses of the subpoenaed witnesses are closely guarded and will not be known to the public until they appear to testify.

the program the Klamath Agency, Chiloquin road, four and a half miles, and the Spring Lake road, five miles, will be surfaced.

The latter half of the program includes additional surfacing of the Midland market road, Rock Creek road on the west side of upper Klamath lake, a new grade in Langgell's valley eight miles on the west side of the valley from Turner Hot Springs to the Langgell's Valley post office.

The county court has signified its willingness to go 50-50 with the Indian service on the construction of the Braymill road. The county court offered last year to match the Indian funds of \$9,000 which would take up \$18,000 for actual construction of the stretch which is virtually impassable during winter months.
