"I expect to start work at once upon a play based upon my experiences in the workhouse," Miss West announced. Her most successful effort as a playwright to date brought her a ten day term after a jury had found her guilty of impairing the public morals.

Ex-Champ Doesn't Approve of Tex's Elimination Plan

WHEELER HOT SPRINGS, Cal., May 2. (U.P.)—Jack Dempsey isn't exactly pleased "over the prospect of meeting two fighters" before he gets a return match with Gene Tunney, but the former heavyweight champion will do so if percentages are right, he told the United Press.

"I don't like Rickard's plan of fighting for the championship," Dempsey said, "but if I can get back into shape and Rickard will give me a big enough percentage for fights with Paulino and the winner of the Maloney-Sharkey I guess I will have to give up my intention of fighting Tunney only."

"I would rather fight Tunney outright for I figure he is no tougher than any of the rest and if Rickard wants me to fight Paulino on percentage I will want the big cut on the gate for I will be the drawing card. The same goes with Maloney or Sharkey."

Dempsey isn't quite sure yet whether he is in condition for a real come back and he doesn't intend to fight any one until he is sure, he said. "I have gotten along nicely in my preliminary work and I am almost convinced that I can come back," the champion said, "but I must be sure of myself. I will quit before I go into a ring out of condition."

"I expect to be here three weeks longer and will probably do my first boxing of the training season next week when I am bringing in some big fellows from Los Angeles."

"If at the end of three weeks I find I can reach my old time condition I will send word to Rickard that I am ready to meet Tunney. If he wants to substitute Paulino and is willing to satisfy me financially that's his business and I'll fight the Basque."

"I have no manager and will make my own arrangements with Rickard for any fights he has in store for me."

"THE GENERAL" IS LAUGH SPECIALTY

"The General" is in town. It's the big laugh spectacle which is convulsing audiences at the Orpheus Theatre.

Based on the humorous side of the Civil War and with Buster Keaton as the star, "The General" represents the last word in elaborate comedies. Running Records Lowered in Big Meet at Seattle

SEATTLE, May 2. (U.P.)—Charles Borah, one of the fastest of all college sprinters, lowered the relay event record for the 100 yard dash here by covering the century distance in 9.7 seconds in the annual University of Washington relay carnival. Borah bettered two-tenths of a second the records previously held by Sweet of Montana and which had stood as the best time ever made during the eight years of these relays.

The feat of the University of Southern California flash was all the more remarkable as the wind was from the north and blowing strong across the track.

The University of Washington, host of the carnival, showed the

way in the field of seven coast conference teams when it won the two-mile feature relay in the new record time of 8:2.1. The previous carnival time was set by Oregon Agricultural college in 1924 at 8:5.1.

A magnificent sprint during the last eighth by Charteris, Washington star was responsible for the great time made by the Husky team for its big front finish.

That it was to be a day of record smashing, despite the unfavorable weather conditions, became apparent at the first crack of the gun. Spaulding of Montana took the opening event—the high hurdles—in 15.6 seconds, lowering the best previous mark, that of Tuck of Oregon.

Briz of Washington broke his own record of last year by taking the shotput with a heave of 45 feet 3 3/4 inches. Thirty-four institutions were represented in the 400 athletes that were on the scene.

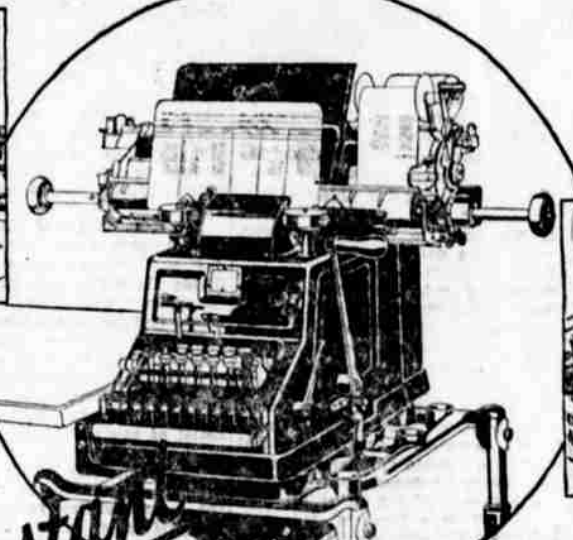
