STANFORD PROVES SUPERIORITY OVER ALL STATE TEAMS

FRESNO, Cal., May 4. (U.P.)—The red shirted athletes of Stanford university again demonstrated track and field superiority over all athletic teams of the state when they won the west coast relays here.

Stanford not only won the meet by a margin of 22 1/2 points over its closest competitor, the Los Angeles A. C., but set a new Pacific coast record for the half mile relay and equaled the Pacific coast record for the 120 yard high hurdles.

The final score of the university and athletic club division was Stanford 53 1/2; Los Angeles A. C. 35; Hollywood A. C. 29; University of Southern California, 20; Olympic club, 18 1/2; California, 1.

J. O. Marrett of Ashland, conductor on Southern Pacific train number 13, was first witness for the state and in direct examination conducted by United States District Attorney George Neuner, gave a detailed story of his experiences in the holdup, murder of the four trainmen and other facts covered in the prosecution's opening statement.

Attorneys for the defense made several objections to the line of questioning, particularly with reference to the witness's description of the wounds in the bodies of Bates, Seng and Johnson. Objections were overruled and court adjourned for noon recess as Marrett was turned over to the defense for cross-examination.

If the defendant was depressed by the opening statement he successfully disguised it and when recess was called, patted his mother on the back, arose jauntily from his seat, and as usual, hurried to the judge's chambers, where he sought the solace of a cigarette.

When, in his closing words, Special Prosecutor Roberts alluded to the defendant's conversation with his mother at Alcatraz Island, Hugh leaned over to his mother with a word and they both shook their heads.

"The evidence will further show and disclose that while talking to his mother at Alcatraz Island, after she had talked to him about making a clean breast of it, he said, 'Mother, don't let them talk you into that, and that he said further, 'Mother, you did not ever think that your nineteen-year-old boy would go wrong, but I did not mean to do it,' and that he said when his mother told him he had no alibi which could be believed, 'he knew that' but that he had a very weird story to tell and with the help of a good lawyer, the jury would believe him."

With a final dramatic appeal, his voice thundering through the quiet court room, Roberts turned to the jury and concluded as follows:

"When the state has established these facts, showing the commission of this horrible atrocity, this cold-blooded murder, as I have outlined to you, it not only feels justified in asking you to return a verdict of guilty here, but expects you by your verdict to make this defendant pay with his life for this deed which was committed."

doing it successfully, except America."

The commissioner's advice to the land settlement board was that they continue with their present program until the next session of congress. "Then you, and all other states seeking development, must get a bill through congress which will pave the way for these long-time loans for new tillers of the soil. The farmer with \$2,000 capital should find several thousand more available, and needs 20 years at least in which to repay it. Your banks cannot offer such loans, so it's up to you and the rest of us to get the aid from the government," Mead declared.

The commissioner's advice to the board of directors of the Klamath Irrigation district, relative to the new contract with the government was "take what you can get, while you can get it." While the commissioner said he was favorable to the district taking over the operation and maintenance of a portion of the project, he advised against such a step.

His reason for this advice was that the government can give the district the money it needs for new drainage projects and other work, at virtually no interest charges, whereas if the district handles its own affairs, it would pay at least seven per cent for money for improvements.

Regarding the new contract, Dr. Mead stated that there is not time to draft a new form and that if the district does not accept this in its present form by May 30, the opportunity will have been lost. "You delay ratification at your own risk," he stated.

The commissioner advised the district to ask congress for a new classification of project lands if they desire it, although he said he
