Liquor Laden Ship Released by U. S.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 4, (U.P.)—With a million dollar cargo of liquor in her hold, the steamer Federalship put to sea Wednesday, free to go on her way after seizure by coast guard cutters and a resultant two months of legal wrangling between Panama, the United States and Canada. Escorted to sea by coast guard patrol boats, the Federalship was to head directly for Buenaventura, Colombia, according to Capt. S. S. Stone, master of the liquor carrier.

CREWS ENDEAVORING TO REACH DEAD MEN

FAIRMONT, W. Va., May 5, (A.P.)—Rescue workers pressed forward today in the hope of reaching some of the seventy miners entombed when a terrific explosion occurred in the Everettville mine here four days ago. The death toll stood at 24.

There was faint hope that a few of the men may have been able to brattle themselves in, but the rescue experts considered the possibility of their having escaped the blast was remote.

Crack Athlete is Opposed to Plan Of Universities

MADISON, Wis., May 5, (U.P.)—Jefferson D. Burrus, prospective Rhodes Scholar and star athlete, believes there is too much college athletics for the few and too little for the many.

Criticizing the present athletic order Burrus, for three years and on the university of Wisconsin football team, star member of the Cardinal crew and named as Rhodes scholar from Wisconsin, has embodied his charges and suggestions in a pamphlet sponsored by the university student union.

He agrees with President Hopkins of Dartmouth that varsity competition should be restricted to two years and that student body and faculty have too little control of competitive athletics.

Burrus makes five charges in his indictment of college sports and offers six remedial suggestions. The charges are:

1. Gymnasium as a compulsory subject for freshmen and sophomore should be replaced by a two-year compulsory sport program. In this time athletes would be groomed for varsity competition.
2. Limit competition on varsity teams to two years.
3. Eliminate spring football, fall track, spring basketball practice.
4. Limit daily practice in all sports to two hours a day.
5. Limit each student to a single competitive sport.
6. Give student body and faculty greater control of athletics.

PHILADELPHIA, May 5, (A.P.)—Pinch hitter Flaxstead's home run in the eighth inning with a man on base gave the Boston Red Sox a 2 to 1 victory over the Philadelphia Athletics.
