

Formal Opening of Williams Building to Be Held Saturday

Announcement Follows Completion of One of Best Business Structures in Southern Oregon; Many Firms Congratulate D. O. Williams on Fine Architectural Achievement

Another milestone in the building progress of Klamath Falls will be formally set up Saturday with the opening of the handsome new Williams building, erected on Main near Eighth at a cost of \$90,000, by D. O. Williams, prominent cattleman of the Klamath basin.

Constructed two stories high, this fine addition to the city's building program has been designed for a four-story structure, and should the occasion arise, the owner can add two more floors to the building.

This strength, combined with the features that have gone into construction of the building for sturdiness, makes the Williams block what is conceded to be one of the best-built structures in southern Oregon.

Attractive Front
The most striking thing about the new building, from the standpoint of the casual observer at least, is the highly decorative front, one of the most beautiful examples of architectural artistry in the city. Features of terra cotta, embodying the spirit of the Klamath ranges through their portrayal of cattle skulls, set off with clusters of pine cones, are the most unique feature of the front.

Williams, with the aid of Jamieson Parker, architect, designed the structure, which is 106 feet deep with a Main street frontage of 65 feet. Nothing has been spared to make it the most modern of present-day business structures.

Spacious Store Rooms
Three spacious store rooms have been arranged on the first floor, with 14 office rooms on the upper story, all built with a view to attractive furnishing and utter efficiency for tenants. The large basement provides ample storage space for both the mercantile firms that are expected to occupy the first floor, and the offices.

Justin and Montgomery, operating the "Men's Wear" store, a new establishment in this city, have leased one store space on the first floor and are now doing business in this stand, although their formal opening will come simultaneously with that of the structure itself, Saturday.

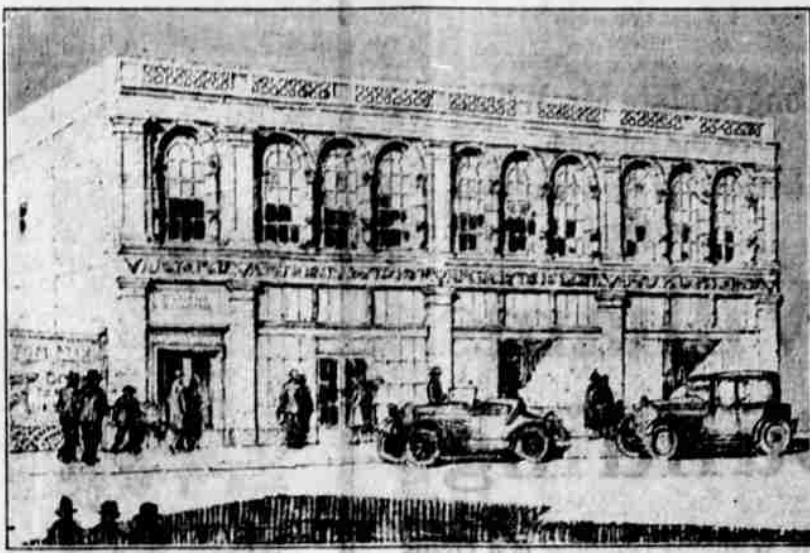
The center store space has been leased by the Western Union for its local offices and equipment. About half the office rooms on the second floor, all of which are outside offices, have already been leased. It was stated.

At the east end of the building is a fine space, not yet leased, for a restaurant, with added space in the basement for a grill room. The restaurant space is the largest of the three.

Marble Entry Way
A marble entry way at the left side of the structure as one approaches the front, lends beauty to the building and provides a spacious entrance to the broad stairway leading to the second-story offices. Entry ways to the stores are similarly constructed and match, in appearance, the balance of the building.

Leasing of the building's offices and store spaces is being handled by Ward & Dale, local realtors. This firm was formerly located on Main and Sixth but with the completion of the Williams building, also outfitted the building with

The enthusiasm of Ward & Dale over the completion of the new building is manifested by the fact that already this firm of real estate dealers has taken offices in the second floor of the structure from where they will manage the building in addition to conducting their regular business.

The expert wiring and attractive electric fixtures which went into the Class A construction of the Williams building were contributed by the Link River Electric company of this city. Here again this firm demonstrated its ability in "electrifying" in the best possible manner, the "bungalow or skyscraper."

J. H. Driscoll was among the first to take office space in the new structure and the Shaw MacRea Stationery company had the pleasure of outfitting the Driscoll office with the best in office furniture, all of which was the Globe-Wernicke steel equipment.

Faith in City
Faith in the Klamath country based on a keen and far-sighted knowledge of its assets and possibilities, impelled D. O. "Buck" Williams, prominent cattleman and owner of the noted Yamsey ranch in the northeastern Klamath, to invest \$90,000 in the Williams block which is now completed and which will be formally opened Saturday.

Mr. Williams purchased the lot on which the building now stands through J. T. Ward, in 1910. Mr. Ward is now managing the building. For years the livestock operator eyed the property waiting for the time to announce construction. When the time came, he did not hesitate.

Mr. Williams is now in the east visiting with relatives. He will return to Klamath in the near future.

Firms Congratulate
Many local business houses will send representatives to the Williams building Saturday to congratulate D. O. Williams on the opening of his fine new structure. All are happy to have witnessed the construction of such an edifice to modern business on Main street space long vacant, and it is declared that they are particularly glad for the fine type of structure that has been built there.

There were also many local firms who contributed in one way or another to the construction and outfitting of the building. Among these is the Claude H. Davis Furniture company which furnished the famed Armstrong linoleum that now graces the floors of offices and stores in the building. This firm also outfitted the building with

(A.P.)—Revolt of eastern basketball coaches against elimination of the dribble has a parallel in the far west, according to a survey of the coast conference made by Coach Bob Hager, of Oregon Agricultural College. It is embodied in an article to appear in the current issue of the Athletic Journal, published by Major John L. Griffith, athletic commissioner of the big ten.

Coach Hager announced today that eight of ten coast conference coaches opposed the new rule on the ground that it would take color and interest from the game without accomplishing the result intended.

Against the rule are coaches Edmondson, Washington; Reinhardt, Oregon; Price, California; McMullan, Idaho; Hunt, Stanford; Schlodman, Washington State; Works, California, Southern Branch, and Hager, Oregon Agricultural College.

Favoring the rule are Coaches Stewart of Montana and Turner, University of Southern California.

O. A. C. Given New Engineers School

CORVALLIS, Ore., May 5. (A.P.)—Regents of Oregon Agricultural College late yesterday established an experiment station and graduate school in engineering, placing the engineering department of this college on a par with that of any land grant institution in the country.

Dean G. A. Covell, who has been on the Oregon Agricultural College faculty for 38 years and dean of the school of engineering since its establishment in 1908, was made director of the experiment station and dean of graduate work in engineering.

H. S. Rogers, professor of hydraulics and irrigation, was promoted to succeed Dean Covell as dean of the undergraduates engineering school. S. H. Graf was made assistant director of the experiment station.

The board made 15 promotions and granted seven sabbatical leaves and four ordinary leaves of absence. Building plans were considered, but no action taken. All but two of the 11 members of the board were present.
