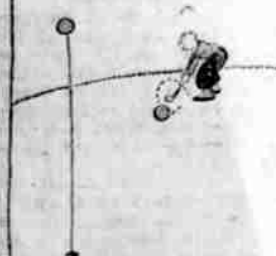
CHINESE FORCE ADVANCES

HUGE CAST OF TALENTED DANCERS IN CIRCUS

DEMPSEY MUST FIGHT WAY TO TITLE

ROYAL ROAD PAVED WITH BLOWS

NEW YORK, May 6. (U.P.)—There is to be no royal road back to the heavyweight throne for William Harrison Dempsey. The way is to be paved with punches.

Tex Rickard, who pays the piper and calls the tune in which the puppet of the prize ring dance, has come out into the open at last and announced the program which awaits the return to duty of the man regarded generally as the greatest fighting machine of all time.

Jack Dempsey, if he would battle once more with the heavyweight championship of the world at stake, must go through with the following program:

July 1, Dempsey must meet and defeat Paulino Uzcudun, the Basque woodchopper.
 August 1—Dempsey must meet and defeat the winner of the Sharkey-Maloney fight, which takes place May 19.

If Jack disposes of these lesser lights, and on, Low Mr. Rickard hopes he can, the latter part of September will be the occasion of another fight for the heavyweight title between Dempsey and Tunney, with the roles of champion and challenger reversed.

Such is the program, the rest is up to Dempsey. That the former champion can return to fighting form and make the grade remains a matter of grave doubt.

We have the word of Gus Wilson that Jack Dempsey is rapidly rounding into splendid condition, which will enable him to waltz through

all opposition, not excluding Tunney and regain the heavyweight title.

Gus, the genial trainer of champions, with his ready smile and continental accent, is one of our favorite optimists. He is honest and sincere, and he comes direct from the California camp where his idol, Dempsey, is experimenting with reflexes, timing, judgment of distance and all those things which go to make man into a destructive, devastating fighter. It is hardly the part of one lacking Gus Wilson's experience as a conditioner of men to question the trainer's judgment, but one recalls a day in September on the eve of the battle of the sesquicentennial, when this same Gus Wilson declared Jack Dempsey to be "in the pink," and a 3 to 1 shot over Gene Tunney.

Dempsey wasn't "in the pink." Rather, he was a somewhat haggard and sluggish shell of his once great self. Nothing that can be said about Jack's condition this spring can be more optimistic than what we heard at Atlantic City last September.

Paulino is not so hard to beat. Knute Hansen and Tom Heeneey, a couple of indifferent heavyweights, turned the trick in the opinion of many of those at the ringside during their fights with the Basque. But Paulino is a tough customer at that.

Then will come the business of disposing of the winner of the Sharkey-Maloney fight within a few weeks after the Paulino bout. In his heyday Dempsey would have been a 2 to 1 shot to whip both these Bostonians in the same night. But the heydays of the erstwhile "Manassa mauler" are memories. Toledo—Boyle's Thirty Acres—the Polo grounds against Firpo—the high spots of Jack's career, flicker before the mind's eye.

The damp mists of Philadelphia wash out the memory of the glowing days and one recalls only the Dempsey who "forgot to duck."

Tex Rickard, however, is a confirmed optimist. Ever since Tunney battered his way to the first heavyweight championship ever won on points, the promoter has had in mind a return battle between Gene and Jack. He knows that is the only title bout possible in 1927 which would repay him for the \$500,000 guarantee he already has made to the new champion.

Incidentally Rickard will go down to the New York Trust company and deposit a second installment of \$100,000 to Tunney's credit. This makes \$200,000 which Tex already has put up, so his interest in Dempsey's condition is not ungenerous.

Initial Skirmish Puts Four Eastern Teams on Defense

 The first inter-sectional skirmish between major league contenders this season put four eastern teams on the defensive in the national league Friday.

While their pitching thus far has been unsteady, the Giants yesterday gave further indication that the shock of the western offensive would be received with a heavy blast of hitting. Hornsby again touched off the big gun in a New York rally which routed the Robins, 4 to 1, polling out a home run with two runners on base to clinch the victory.

Today the Giants were paired off against the fifth place Cubs, and Brooklyn against the league leading St. Louis Cardinals, who rode to victory yesterday over the Pirates 4 to 2. The other two meless pit the tail-end Cincinnati Reds against Boston and the Pirates against Philadelphia.
