ity of the tunnel, the day before the attempted holdup.

There will also be the testimony of postal inspectors relative to the part they played in the world wide hunt, and alleged statements, made by Hugh to his mother, in the army prison on Alcatraz Island, San Francisco Bay, after his return from the Philippines.

Two days of the trial last week, were devoted to the identifying and introduction of exhibits and was devoid of interest.

Defense Plan Unknown

What the defense will be, and whether they will call the defendant to the stand in his own behalf is still unknown. Hints dropped during the trial, indicate they will endeavor to prove the crime was one of revenge, with the holdup as a mask, and the quadruple murders, a savage step to prevent identification, and that Johnson was killed by gunshot fired from one of the forward cars by some one who mistook him for one of the bandits in the excitement. It is also expected that the defense will offer an alibi, as to the whereabouts of the defendant during the progress of the trial.

Throughout the trial, De Austrom has been up well under the ordeal manifesting more than average interest in the proceedings only when testimony concerning the pistol is under way. Saturday morning he made no effort to conceal his content, when Witness Bonwell testified he did not see him, during the purchase of the automatic pistol, from a Salem, Oregon, concern. His iron nerve is unshaken. He will observe Mother's Day, by a specially granted visit from his mother to the jail.

To Last 3 Weeks

The present indications point that the trial will be concluded in its third week, the day depending on the amount of rebuttal testimony both sides will introduce. It is expected that all the evidence will be introduced by next Saturday and that the final arguments will start the following Monday.

Public interest in the trial is still at a high pitch, with a majority of the spectators being women and girls.

JIM, THE CONQUEROR COMES TO PINT TREE

That delightful romance, Peter R. Kyne, seems to have a particular penchant for writing stories that register effectively on the screen. The latest photoplay based on a Kyne story, "Jim the Conqueror," which opens at the Liberty Theatre today maintains the record of screen successes made from this popular writer's books.

"Jim the Conqueror" is a melodrama of modern romance. AMERICAN WOMEN VIE FOR HONORS IN LONDON SOCIETY

Once more the struggle for social supremacy among American society women living in London, has commenced and promises to be well under way when the season opens, early in May.

London's annual social events will, it is expected, be enhanced in brilliancy by prominent holders of American dollars who plan, as usual, to eclipse one another's efforts to dazzle society here with sumptuous receptions.

Among the forerunners of the American social invasion of London this year are Mrs. James Corrigan who has followed her annual custom of taking a house in the most exclusive residential district of Grosvenor street and Mrs. Corlette Glorney, a daughter of the late copper king, Isaac Guggenheim, who will occupy a house on Park Lane. London hostesses, the society topic of the day, are being freely discussed at this time, not only by interested rivals but also by a small army of social newspaper and magazine writers. In a recent article, a London magazine dwelt at length upon the contrast between two of London's most famous hostesses, the first, Mrs. Ronald Greville, typical of Britain's oldest aristocracy, the second being Lady Astor, well-known here for her many native-born American ideas which have both shocked and delighted British public opinion for some years past.

Of Mrs. Greville the written portrait says: "Three generations of British royalty have been her guests at Poleston, her house near Dorking. King Edward was a constant visitor. King George and Queen Mary stayed there in 1920 and the Duke and Duchess of York spent the first part of their honeymoon under the hospitable roof."

"Mrs. Greville has always been the type of a successful Edwardian hostess. Lady Astor is almost exclusively Georgian. One is impressing and dignified; the other brimming over with vitality and enthusiasm, careless of convention or criticism."

"One is a great believer in the aristocratic principle, the other a democrat eager to make converts."

"Mrs. Greville is a trenchant, racy talker, and has known all the kings and princes and others who have been of any account in Europe during the last quarter of a century, and most other people of distinction besides."

"She was the step-daughter of a Scotch millionaire, the Right Hon. William M'Ewan, a warm supporter of Gladstone, and married the eldest son of the second Lord Greville who had the misfortune to die a year before his father, and so failed to succeed to his title."

Regarding England's democratic hostess, of whom the article says she represents "the future," the writer declares: "Lady Astor is, in fact, a tyrant of the drawing-room. She is the antithesis of Mrs. Greville. Rank, riches, even brains, and she has all three, mean nothing to her except as means by which to carry on her grandees. "At heart she is prouder of being a Virginian than of being an American. Being a Virginian, it is surprising to find her a Puritan, for American puritanism derives rather from the Mayflower tradition in New England than the aristocratic culture of the south. But a Puritan she is, with all the vigor and daring of a dynamic personality. She is fearless, frank and resolute."

"As a hostess she is remarkable for the size of her parties, where one meets everyone of consequence in any walk of life."

"When she gives a ball or a party for charity everyone present must pull their weight: Lady Astor must have one of the fullest engagements books in London."

So it seems that this year, to become a "tyrant of the drawing-room" will be the main object of London's American society women.

FOREST GROVE, Ore., May 7. (A.P.)—The 1927 honors of the annual interscholastic track meet of Oregon went to Corvallis high school here today when that aggregation piled up 49 3-4 points to lead the eight high school teams entered in the meet. Salem high was second with 48 1/2 points, Beaverton third with 24, Hillsboro with 19 1/2; Silverton with 6 1/2, Forest Grove with 4, Independence with 2, and Woodburn with 1.

Signum of Salem was high point man of the meet with 11 1/4 points, taking first in the low hurdles and in the 220 yard dash, and running in the winning relay team.

Earth Shocks

MEMPHIS, Tenn., May 7. (A.P.)—Earth tremors were felt early today in Memphis and a dozen or more other towns within a radius of 100 miles north and west of this city. Reports received here indicated that the tremor was slight. No damage was reported.

The first tremor was felt at 2:35 o'clock and another a few minutes later. Covington, Tenn., and Cartersville, Mo., were the most distant points from Memphis reporting having been shaken.

Several of the towns reported to have felt the shocks are adjacent to the area affected by the Mississippi river flood.

Pursuant to Ordinance No. 888 of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, notice is hereby given that bids will be received by the Police Judge of said City at his office in the City Hall, up to and including Monday, the 16th day of May, 1927, at 8 o'clock p. m., for making the necessary improvement of Mt. Whitney street, extending from the Northern line of Seventh Street to the Southern line of Rose Street, including the intersections at Eighth Street.

Said improvements to consist of paving said portions of said street, with Type "A" Warrentite bluthtic pavement, Type "A" asphaltic concrete, six-inch cement concrete or six-inch vibrobluthtic pavement; or with Type "B" Warrentite bluthtic pavement, or Type "B" asphaltic concrete pavement; said improvement to be made includes the grading of said street to the established grade, to be of such width and dimensions shown on the plans and specifications of the City Engineer, on file with the Police Judge of Klamath Falls, Oregon, to which reference is hereby made. Said improvement to include combination concrete curb and gutter and drainage; a four-foot sidewalk on each side of said street and sanitary sewers in each of the adjacent and parallel alleys; concrete steps, pavement, headers and drainage facilities, all of said proposed improvements to be made together with the materials to be used, in accordance with said plans and specifications and estimates of the City Engineer on file in the office of the Police Judge of said City to which reference is hereby made for further details for plans, construction, materials, quantities and the like.

Said improvement will be let in one contract and bids will be received for each kind of pavement specified above, and will be opened for consideration by the Common Council on the said 16th day of May, 1927, at the hour of 8 o'clock p. m. Bidders will be required to submit bids on blanks prepared by the City Engineer, and bids will not be considered unless so submitted. Bids for bids may be obtained at the office of the City Engineer in the City Hall.

The successful bidder will be required to give a bond in a sum to be fixed by the Common Council for the faithful performance of the contract to be entered into for making said improvement. Each bid must be accompanied by a check certified by some responsible bank for five (5) per cent of the amount bid, as a guarantee that the successful bidder will enter into contract with the City for the making of such improvement within ten (10) days from the date of making such award.

The Common Council reserves the right to reject any and all bids, and to make such improvement on behalf of the City.

Plane Race Over Ocean is Planned

PARIS, May 7. (U.P.)—A Franco-American race across the Atlantic between planes starting nearly simultaneously from the American and French sides, was suggested tonight by Francois Coll, who with Charles Nungesser, hopes to land in New York harbor after a trans-Atlantic flight from Le Bourget air port, outside Paris.

Admitting that he and Nungesser had been forced to postpone their take-off from Saturday morning to Sunday, due to bad weather, on the Atlantic, Coll suggested a race between them and the Wright Helanca plane which Boyd W. Bertrand and Clarence Chamberlain, American fliers, hope to fly to Paris from Curtis Field, Long Island.

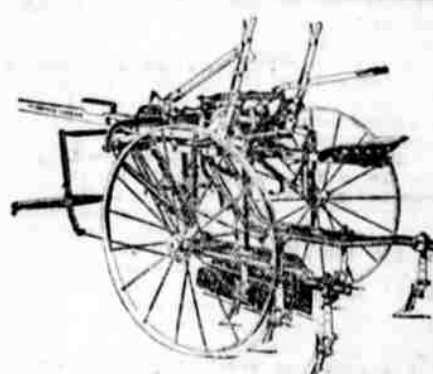
