Local Anglers Get Big Fish Near Dam

They're snagging 'em big in the Rogue River, according to Marion Barnes, who, with a number of Klamath sportsmen, spent Sunday below the Savage Rapids dam near Grants Pass, fighting 20- and 30-pound chinook salmon.

"The run up Rogue river is at its peak right now," Barnes declared. "and if the fishing was ever any better, there never was a time when the salmon were in better shape. They're fresh out of salt water and are as hard and fat as fish could possibly be."

Among those who fished below the dam Sunday and came home with sizeable chinooks, were the McCollum brothers, who hooked and landed a 40-pounder; Red Piper, who returned with a 30-pound fish, and Harry Poole, Fred Houston, Walt Waggoner and Otis Dean, all of whom made good catches, Barnes stated.

The salmon have not started to spawn as yet, he said.

Fight laurels between the basin and the valley—Klamath and Rogue River—will be up for a crown tonight at Chiloquin, when Johnnie Fugate, local pug, mixes leather with Jess Ingram, of Medford.

These fighters are to do the main event and its outcome is being watched with considerable interest. Fugate is good, as Klamath fans know, and Ingram comes here with a good reputation, so the contest has the earmarks of one which will result in a landmark.

Coolidge Linked With Diaz Fight

PUERTO CADEZAS, Nicaragua, May 9, (U.P.)—Juan B. Sarcasa, liberal claimant to the Nicaraguan presidency and leader in the revolution against conservative President Diaz, charged today that Henry L. Simpson, President Coolidge's personal representative here, had failed to arrange an honorable basis for peace in Nicaragua.

Referring to Simpson's "intimation to the liberal delegate that if the liberals did not accept Diaz, United States troops would forcibly disarm the liberal troops," Sarcasa said: "I judge it to be entirely inadequate as a basis for an honorable settlement of the conflict which will insure harmony between liberals and conservatives. This was the purpose of the invitation to me to send my representative to Managua. If we don't accept Diaz, it is because he is one of the principals and jointly responsible for the coup d'etat which shattered the constitution and the Central American treaties signed at Washington."

LEAVENWORTH, Kansas, May 9, (U.P.)—The T. C. 10, giant army non-rigid dirigible, which returned to Fort Leavenworth from Fort Sill, Oklahoma, yesterday because of stormy weather encountered there this afternoon, broke its moorings and collapsed when the silk envelope was cut.

Rip cords were pulled when the blimp broke away releasing the gas and preventing the escape of the craft. There was no damage to equipment except to the envelope and no one was injured.
