

NOTICE TO PROPERTY OWNERS
WHOSE PROPERTY HAS BEEN FOUND LIABLE FOR THE COST OF IMPROVING SPRING STREET FROM THE NORTH LINE OF MAIN STREET TO THE SOUTH LINE OF EXPLANADE, AND WALL STREET FROM THE WEST LINE OF SPRING STREET TO THE EAST LINE OF BROAD STREET, AND KNOWN AS IMPROVEMENT UNIT NO. 63, THAT THEY HAVE TWENTY DAYS FROM THE FIRST DATE OF PUBLICATION OF THIS NOTICE IN WHICH TO FILE APPLICATION TO PAY THEIR ASSESSMENTS IN TEN EQUAL ANNUAL INSTALLMENTS.

WHEREAS, the Common Council of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, did by Ordinance No. 399, May, 1927, declare the proportionate assessment on each lot, part of lot, block or parcel of acreage property found to be benefited, for a proportionate share of the cost of improving Spring street from the north line of Main street to the south line of Explanade, and Wall street from the west line of spring street to the east line of Broad street, all as more fully and in detail shown on the plans and specifications of the City Engineer on file with the Police Judge of said City, in the matter of said improvement.

The property so found benefited and liable and assessed as aforesaid, is all the property lying adjacent to said parts of said streets between the aforementioned terminal, and are as follows:

KAPPA HOLD FAST TO GRADE HONORS

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, May 1.—Highest scholastic rating on the University of Oregon campus for winter term was retained by Kappa Kappa Gamma, women's national sorority, for the second time this year, with an average of 81.400 points. Alpha Chi Omega and Alpha Xi Delta, both women's organizations, were second and third respectively, the registrar's office announced. The men's organizations were headed by Alpha Beta Chi, in twelfth place.

MAYOR'S PROCLAMATION OF THE RESULT OF THE SPECIAL ELECTION HELD IN AND FOR THE CITY OF KLAMATH FALLS, OREGON, ON MAY 6, 1927.

WHEREAS, by virtue of Ordinance No. 554 of the City of Klamath Falls, of Klamath County, Oregon, adopted on the 18th day of July, 1921, and approved by the Mayor on the 18th day of July, 1921, a special election was lawfully called and duly held in said city, on Friday, the 6th day of May, 1927, for the purpose of submitting to the electors of the said city for their approval or rejection, an amendment to the charter of the said city by adding thereto a new section, numbered 169 1/2, which section numbered 169 1/2 was and is in words and figures as follows:

"Section 169 1/2. Whenever the owners of 50% or more in area of the property within any district, make and file with the Police Judge a petition to establish a special lighting system within such district, the Council shall have the power and authority to install, operate and maintain a special street lighting system or systems upon any street or streets, or any part or parts thereof within said district, and to furnish electrical current for the lighting thereof by awarding contracts therefor, for a period of not to exceed ten years, and to provide for the payment of the cost of the original installation and the operation and maintenance, and the furnishing of electrical current for the lighting thereof, by the levying and collection of local assessments on property benefited thereby. Whenever any such system is to be installed, operated, maintained, and or lighted at the expense of property benefited and to be assessed therefor, the Council shall take proceedings similar to those required for constructing street improvements, and the method of making assessments and collecting the same as is or may be provided in the City Charter relative to street im-

provements, shall apply, including the right of remonstrance, and the right and privilege of bonding the original cost of installation, the original and subsequent cost of operation and maintenance, and or furnishing electrical energy for the lighting thereof for such period of time as may be fixed by the Council, not exceeding five years.

At the expiration of any such or subsequent period, the Council shall have power and authority to continue the operation of any such special street lighting system or systems, and to award contracts for the furnishing of electrical current for the lighting thereof, and to pay the subsequent cost thereof, in the same manner as is provided for original construction, operation, maintenance, and or lighting.

In the event the privilege of bonding is exercised, the property owners bonding shall pay all assessments in equal semi-annual installments, with interest, and all bonds shall be issued by the Council in the same manner as provided by the City Charter for issuing bonds for street improvements, except that bonds issued for the purposes herein provided, shall mature in five years from the date thereof.

The Council shall have power and authority to amend such ordinance or ordinances as shall be needed to give full effect to this Section; and

WHEREAS, the election returns of the said special election were duly filed in the office of the Police Judge on the 6th day of May, 1927, and said returns were duly canvassed by the Mayor, Police Judge and a Justice of the Peace of the said City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, on the third day after the said election and a statement of said canvass was duly filed in the office of the Police Judge on the said date; and

WHEREAS, under and by virtue of the provisions of Section 15, Ordinance No. 554, passed and approved on the 18th day of July, 1921, the Mayor of said City is directed to forthwith issue his pro-

clamation of the result of the said election within 15 days from the date of said election, by publication in a newspaper, published in the city of Klamath Falls, or by posting printed or typewritten copies of such proclamation in at least two conspicuous places in said city, and

WHEREAS, the Mayor has elected to publish said proclamation in the city official newspaper of the said city, NOW THEREFORE by virtue of the premises,

I, Tom B. Watters, the duly elected, qualified and acting Mayor of the City of Klamath Falls, in Klamath County, Oregon, do hereby declare and proclaim that the amendment to the said charter known as Section 169 1/2 as hereinabove set forth has been adopted by the voters of said city by a vote of 236 "YES" and "NO" 164, as set out in detail in the statement of the canvass of the election returns now on file in the office of the Police Judge of said city, and I do further proclaim and declare said charter amendment to be in full force and effect from this date and day.
