

Dancey Will Tell Story of Escape From Germans

Tonight, in Legion Hall, under the auspices of the American Legion, Captain S. N. Dancey will tell the story of his escape from a German prison camp. The program will start promptly at 8 o'clock so as to permit the audience to attend Western Nights at the Elks club. The general public is invited.

The orchestra of Klamath county high school will furnish a number of selections and there will be community singing. Students of local schools are deeply interested in tonight's program and will be largely represented, with their families. Captain Dancey's story was featured in The Saturday Evening Post several years ago, and awakened nationwide interest. He will associate with his war experiences a number of the more outstanding conditions, the aftermath of the World war.

Today noon, Captain Dancey will address the Rotary club, taking as his subject, the sixth object, revolving around world peace. This afternoon, he will speak to members of the Library club, and, following the mass meeting in Legion hall tonight, will talk to a mass meeting of local labor unions. This will conclude his program in Klamath Falls.

Lawless Redskins Sent to Hoosegow

Jerry Chocktoot, member of a prominent Indian family, will serve 60 days in the county jail for possession of liquor, and a half breed Indian, Selby Lawver, will reside for 90 days in the county hoosegow because he interfered with John Lee Ball in the performance of that officer's duty.

Thus states the official jail record held under lock and key in Sheriff Burt E. Hawkins' office.

Chocktoot, according to John Lee Ball, special Indian officer, was carrying around too much liquor in his car at Beatty. When a gallon was found he was taken before Justice of the Peace J. J. Brophy of Chiloquin and sentenced to 60 days in the county jail and costs of \$2.10. Ball was in the act of apprehending a second Indian offender when Lawver, in some manner, "broke up the party" and ended in the county jail with 90 days to serve. The sentence was a gift from Justice Brophy early Thursday afternoon. Lawver was arrested on Sprague River.

Members of the county court, including County Judge F. R. Goddard, and Commissioners Dunlap and Short, will attend a meeting at Hildebrand at 8 o'clock tonight, at the request of the Hildebrand residents, who are interested in the immediate construction of market roads in that district.

The Hildebrand meeting is one of many that have been conducted throughout the county by various communities when the county court meets with them to discuss the possibility of completing or construction, or even repairing roads in that particular section.

The Indian girl was arrested by State Traffic Officer Walter Foster, taken before Brophy and then brought into Klamath Falls by Special Indian Officer Walter Huff. She will be given a hearing before Justice of the Peace W. B. Barnes today, the sheriff's office stated.
