Investigated Klamath Falls as a possible site for the hotel project, and urged Mr. Barnes to give serious consideration to this city.

"Although definite plans cannot be given out at this time," said Colonel Schell, "we feel that Klamath Falls has the greatest future of any town in the Pacific Northwest, and for that reason we will keep in close touch with the local situation and will endeavor to make some announcement soon."

"It may not be out of place here to state that the site has virtually been selected and that materials have already been bought with the project in mind. Disclosure of the site will not be made public until such time as officials interested in the plan desire to make them public. Obviously this is a good business policy and for that reason only, is this being done."

"Reports on Klamath Falls as the most likely choice of all Barnes agents have been so high and meet with the approval of Mr. Barnes personally, that it is safe to announce definitely at this time that, having foreseen previous, the project will go through."

Pelicans Win Game From Grants Pass

The Klamath Falls Pelicans, in one of the fastest and most successful games ever played this side of the mountains, let the Grants Pass players start with the short end of a 15 to 18 score in the final diamond battle.

The Josephine county team, who placed last and consistent ball, could not keep the Pelicans from their plan of attack and the smooth-running local machine took the first round game of the season from the visitors.

Five events were recorded on the score sheet during the early part of the game, but equilibrium was soon restored and "Burt" Wheeler's consistent pitching led the boys in on their own. Four homers gave the Pelicans the edge on the visiting nine, two from Peterson's bat and one from Martin's and the other from Powell's bickery stick.

Klamath Falls turned out en masse to attend the initial encounter of the Klamath Falls Pelicans on the home grounds in the Southern Oregon League. There were 1400 paid admissions, one of the largest attended games Klamath has ever known.

The Pelicans, with no defeats in the record book, will meet the Medford side Sunday on the local field and with last Sunday's game as a good seasonal starter, there is anticipated a larger crowd this Sunday than last.
