SPORT FLASHES

MINNEAPOLIS, May 17.—Theory that a flycatcher has no place in the infield has been rudely foisted by Dick Lotius, young Minneapolis player.

Obtained in a trade with Brooklyn, Lotius came in from center field to do some first-sacking in a pinch and distinguished himself by figuring in four double-plays in one game, starting two himself.

LONDON, May 17.—Evelyn Collier, noted English lawn-tennis player, has embarked on a business career.

Miss Collier is undergoing two months preliminary training before taking up a post on the executive staff. She will keep usual business hours, which will prevent her from getting much tennis practice, but she hopes to be able to take part in the Wimbledon tournament in June.

PINEHURST, May 17.—Wm. C. Fowkes, Jr., of Pittsburgh, president of the United States Golf Association, disagrees with the decision of the Professional Golf Association to have a "homebred" team represent this country against the British in the June Ryder Cup matches.

"There should be no distinction between the professional who has come to this country and become a citizen and our native born players," he said.

FAYETTEVILLE, Ark. May 17.—Keen eyes on the sights are rolling up a great string of victories for the University of Arkansas rifle team.

The squad of 15 razorbacks won first honors for the senior division of the Seventh Corps Area for 1927, with a total of 7,845 of a possible 8,000 points, finishing ahead of the Universities of Missouri, Minnesota, and Kansas in the order named. The razorbacks, with the next five highest, represented the corps area in the senior national matches.

CHICAGO—A swimming coach who developed a dozen holders of world records says that swimming is to him "just like lying in the softest bed I ever reclined in."

The teams of William Bachrach, 281-pound tank tutor of the Illinois Athletic club, have dominated the swimming world for a decade. He coached Johnny Welamuller, Arne Borg, Norman Ross, Ethel Lackie and others. He coached the last Olympic squad.

LONDON—France will send a team of three motor boats this year to compete for the Duke of York's trophy, which was won last year by Great Britain with Miss Carstairs' "Newg."

Germany is sending two boats, and with entries from the United States also, Britain will have trouble in retaining the trophy.

NEW HAVEN, Conn.—Frederick Harry Sturdy, Yale's sophomore pole-vaulter, is proving himself a star runner-up to Sabin Carr.

Sturdy placed second this year at the B. A. A. games in March with 12 feet 6 inches. His scholastic work makes him a "ranking scholar." He was graduated from Los Angeles High School and entered Yale with the class of 1929.

WASHINGTON, May 16, (P)—Suffering from a slight cold, President Coolidge went to bed today after a morning at his desk.

Dr. Jas. F. Coupal, his physician, said the cold, centered in the chest, was slight and involved no increase of temperature or pulse. He prescribed the afternoon in bed for the president, however, in view of the executives engagement to speak tomorrow night before the American medical association in convention here.

DE PINEDO SIGHTED IN COURSE OF TRIP

WILSON, N. Y., May 17, (P)—Commander Francesco De Pinedo, Italian four-continent flier, passed over this village at 4:30 p. m. eastern daylight time, today on his way from Chicago to Montreal. Pastor Involved In \$50,000 Suit

WASHINGTON, May 17, (P)—The Rev. Dr. Jason Noble Pierce, widely known as pastor of the First Congregational Church, which is attended by President and Mrs. Coolidge, has become the defendant in a \$50,000 libel suit growing out of letters written to the shipping board about Howard T. Cole, an engineer of the board.

Cole's attorneys have filed a complaint with the District of Columbia supreme court, attaching to it copies of two letters they said Dr. Pierce had sent to Brigadier General A. C. Dalton in charge of the board's ship operations, demanding that Cole be dismissed and containing charges reflecting on Cole's private life. The attorneys characterized these assertions as false and malicious and designed to blast his reputation. Dr. Pierce has retained Frank J. Hogan, who successfully defended E. L. Doherty and Albert B. Fall in the Elk Hills reserve case as his counsel. Mr. Hogan has declared he advised Dr. Pierce that his actions were "entirely in line with his duties as a pastor."

One of the letters spoke of investigations by deacons of the First Congregational Church, but a later one asked that portions of the charges be stricken out. The writer explained this by saying that he had been "led to suppose that officers of my church had followed Cole more often than I find they have." Therefore, it was added, one paragraph of the charges were "circumstantial and not clearly proven."

Cole's complaint said he had always been a "law abiding, upright and moral man," and that the sole purpose of the pastor was to bring him into "scandal and disgrace, to humiliate, mortify and embarrass him, and to drive him from the city of Washington and to cause him to lose his position."

Raid on Quarters Of Soviet Failure

LONDON, May 17, (U.P.)—The government had admitted defeat in its sensational raid on the headquarters of the Russian Trade Delegation.

Sir William Joynton-Hicks, home secretary, maintained, however, that while a lost state department document had not been found by his raiders in the soviet center, the document was known to have reposed there at one time.

Joynton-Hicks, who assumed responsibility for police action, declared in the House of Commons that while the documents have not been found, the police were in possession of "certain papers," and that examination of them was still going on.

threat of blackmail. When he told them he had little money in his checking account, they took a car instead, Dunham alleged. This occurred, Dunham testified, after Walsh, a former wrestler, had splintered his arm. Dunham appeared in court with his left arm in a cast.

The prosecution introduced a number of witnesses. Archie Haskins, of the Dunham garage, A. S. Taylor, Dodge garage employee, Seth Wattiers, salesman for Dunham, Dr. L. L. Truax, who operated on Dunham's arm following the alleged assault by Walsh and his wife, and E. W. Whetstone, policeman.

Determined to end the case in one day, if possible, the state began grilling witnesses as they were called, one by one, drawing from them all possible information which would lead to conviction of Mr. and Mrs. Walsh and Smith.

District Attorney William Duncan is assisted by Horace Manning in the prosecution of the case. Walsh and his wife have retained W. H. A.



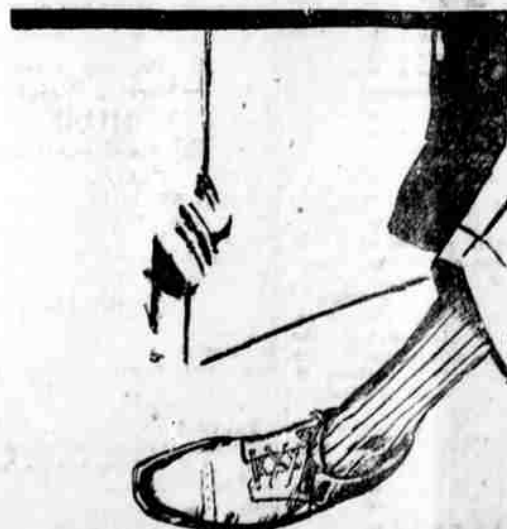
