Jack Dempsey, long called the "Manassa Mauler" and credited up to his fight with Tunney as being a man killer, is painted in an interesting light by a Kansas City police officer, long an admirer and personal friend of the ex-champ.

The officer, William M. Meyers, with the kindest of feeling toward Dempsey depicts him as a man lacking confidence, fearful of the outcome of every fight in which he participated, and held to his task only by the clever psychological appreciations of Jack Kearns.

Off hand one is inclined to take this opinion of Dempsey lightly in view of his achievements in the ring—his visible ferocity and the net results of it.

But on the other hand it may well be true that Dempsey, before his fights, was fearful of the outcome. Courage is born of fear. The men who tremble going into battle may and do go to death with a smile on their lips once the first flush of fear is ended.

There are fighters, too, who do not arise to their best until stung badly by their opponent. The first blow seems to unleash something within them—call it fighting spirit or what you will.

However, if Dempsey does lack confidence in himself this trait, so cleverly hidden to date, should bob up in his efforts to come back, especially if the going gets rough.

If Jack's comeback does nothing more than furnish some data on which to establish definitely his place as a fighter it will not have been in vain.

Close followers of the Chicago Cubs state that the failure of Riggs Stephenson, Manager McCarthy's "hope" at third base, to deliver there was caused more by mental anguish than lack of all around playing ability.

McCarthy, hoping to inject the maximum amount of batting power into his lineup, shifted Stephenson from the outfield to the last corner when the season opened. He was aware that Stevie's throwing would handicap him, but felt that the slugger's offensive help would more than offset that.

As it turned out Stevie's hitting dropped off the moment he tried to play the third turn, due entirely to his worry over the job. Howard Frigau has been playing third since the experiment failed.
