WASHINGTON, May 19. (AP)—Secretary Mellon has about decided on the man who will be permanent prohibition commissioner, and his decision probably will be made public tomorrow.

Roy A. Haynes, strongly supported by the anti-saloon league, is holding the post of acting commissioner, but other organizations have vigorously opposed him. Dr. Jas. M. Doran of North Dakota, chief chemist of the prohibition bureau, and Seymour Lowman, former lieutenant governor of New York, are among those who have been under consideration as appointees. Secretary Mellon said today. Several others from time to time have been considered.

Basque's Progress One for the Hook

NEW YORK, May 19. (U.P.)—Paolino's progress is one for the hook.

The Basque has shown his wares but twice before critical American fight fans. He was outboxed by Kaute Hansen, the Timorons Dane, and by Tom Heeley, the New Zealander, although he received the decision of a majority of the judges upon both occasions.

After failing to demonstrate anything resembling class against these second raters, Paolino broke a rib and all his promises to the various fight promoters with whom he had signed, and sat down to wait for Tex Rickard to pave a path to his doorway with greenbacks.

Rickard came along presently with a \$30,000 offer for Paolino to box Jack Delaney.

The New York State Athletic Commission, which knows something about fractured ribs and boxing contracts, turned its thumbs down on the proposition. It suspended the Basque indefinitely, or until such time as he should get through with an agreement to meet Ed Keely of Boston.

But Paolino merely grinned his 18-karat grin and strummed on his Spanish guitar.

Twenty-four hours later, Rickard was back with an even more lucrative proposition for the Basque—a bout with Jack Dempsey.

For a second rate foreign fighter there is considerable progress. And Paolino hasn't even knocked down an opponent.

NEW YORK, May 19. (U.P.)—Miller Huggins is a lucky little cuss.

One of the most important features of his good fortune stands six feet two and cavorts about first base when the weather is fine and the Yanks are playing baseball.

Each night before he goes to bed in the antique Howler crib he has never outgrown, Huggins gives thanks for one Lou Gehrig, his 22-year-old, 200-pound first baseman.

Lou is getting to be a better ball player every day and he was no small factor in the Yankee pennant winning machine of 1926. Although Gehrig was but a college alumnus—a Columbia graduate, at that—Huggins slapped him into a uniform last year and told him he was the first baseman on a championship ball club. Lou filled the job.

LEGALIZE BEER MAKING

MADISON, Wis., May 19. (A.P.)—The lower house of the state assembly today passed "bill of rights for the home brewer" by a vote of 56 to 34. The bill would legalize the manufacture of beer of 2.75 percent alcoholic content by persons in their homes.

Love Was Cause Of Powell's Death

LOS ANGELES, May 19. (AP)—A coroner's jury here today returned a verdict that George J. Powell Jr., wealthy business man was shot by his secretary, Marie Pike, with homicidal intent before she turned the gun on herself. The bodies were found Tuesday in Powell's auto.

That Miss Pike was in love with Powell was indicated by testimony of witnesses before the coroner's jury. Miss Myrtle Eden, roommate of the dead girl, said that a month ago, Miss Pike told her a woman could love but once and that none could love as tenderly as she. Testimony was given that Powell never took his secretary out on evenings, that she was never out of her rooming house later than 7 in the evening and that Powell had twice discharged her because of her unwelcome attentions and temperamental unfitness for the office. Powell, it was shown, did not even know her address until the night of the tragedy when he went there to give her a salary check following her dismissal.

PORTLAND, May 19. (U.P.)—Proposals for surfacing in forest sections of the Klamath Falls-Lakeview highway, 11 miles, will be received and opened tomorrow. McGraw Tells How To Win Ball Games

NEW YORK, May 19. (U.P.)—John J. McGraw, who knows more about winning baseball pennants than any other major league manager, has an interesting theory.

"Clean up in the series against clubs that are easy to beat," said the manager of the Giants recently, "and the series against your stronger rivals will take care of themselves."

It is McGraw's idea that a game won from the Braves, the Phillies or the Robins counts just as much in his club's "games won" column as a victory over the Cardinals or the Pirates.

"When two strong pennant contenders meet," said he, "the best either can reasonably look for, if they are evenly matched, is an even break."

"The way to win pennants is to knock over the weaklings with just as much determination as though your club were engaged in what sports writers refer to as a 'crucial series.' I never permit the Giants to take things easy against Brooklyn or Boston."

There is no percentage in taking three out of four from St. Louis and dropping three out of four to Philadelphia.

In this connection, it is interesting to note that the world's champion St. Louis Cardinals accomplished in 1926 precisely what John McGraw advocates, and thus won the first pennant in the club's history.

St. Louis finished first in the National League race last year by virtue of 45 victories over the three tail-enders, Brooklyn, Boston and Philadelphia. No other club did as well against the cellar group. The Cardinals were beaten 14 times out of 22 by the Cincinnati Reds, their closest rivals, and only held their own against the Cubs and Giants. But when they swept through the East, they knocked over the Braves, annihilated the Phillies and trampled on the Robins.

The result waves over Sportsman's Park.
