

Seattle-Portland Service Started

PORTLAND, Ore., May 20, (AP)—The Pacific Air Transport today established regular passenger cabin airplane service between Portland and Seattle and announced excursion rates effective for 30 days.

The big Fokker planes, which are capable of carrying four passengers and air mail will leave Pierson field, at Vancouver Barracks at noon, and arrive at Seattle at 1:20, returning the plane will leave the air mail field, Seattle at 2 p. m. and arrive at Pierson field at 3:20.

N. B. Evans, traffic manager of the Pacific Air Transport in announcing the service today said that the company will offer for thirty days a special fare of \$12 one way, and round trip \$20. Effective for 30 days. He said that the amount of surcharge would determine whether the low fares would be continued.

"We want to give the public an opportunity to try air transportation in cabin planes, so that the people can learn the comforts and advantages of this air travel. These are the lowest ever established in the world."

German Count to Get Good Welcome

SAN FRANCISCO, May 20, (UP)—When Count Felix von Luckner, former commander of the famous German sea raider, the Sea Adder, arrives in San Francisco a week from today, he will be welcomed cordially by Mayor James Rolph, Jr., war-time enemy of the count.

When Count von Luckner won the title of the hero of thirty bloodless victories on the Pacific his activities included the sinking of two ships in which Mayor Rolph was financially interested, the A. R. Johnson and the Encore. The ships were captured while en route to Sydney, Australia, but there was no loss of life when they went down.

It was the count's treatment of the crews of these vessels that won him Mayor Rolph's regard. The men were taken from the seized ships, treated courteously, given the best of food and drink, and finally set down upon friendly soil.

In a statement concerning Count von Luckner, Mayor Rolph said that the visitor, coming here after a lecture tour in the east and traveling on the schooner Vaterland, would be extensively entertained and fed.

Woman Has Narrow Accident Escape

SHEDD, Ore., May 20, (UP)—Mrs. T. C. Kenesies, 60, of Los Angeles, narrowly escaped death today when the automobile she was driving was crowded from the highway just south of here and turned over into a ditch filled with water.

Mrs. Kenesies was pinned beneath the machine with her head under water. It was with great difficulty that her companions raised her head out of water and held her in that position until aid arrived from Shedd. Physicians at the Allany General hospital, where Mrs. Kenesies was taken, said her condition was serious, due to her advanced age.

IRELAND WILL BE FREE, SAYS EAMON

LOS ANGELES, May 20, (UP)—Ireland will soon be as free from foreign domination as the United States, according to Eamon de Valera, former president of the Irish Republic, here on a speaking tour.

The Sinn Fein leader, carrying on the fight which put him in various Irish prisons in 1923, is making an attempt "to further the cause of independent Ireland." De Valera said it was pleasing to find the "sham" of Irish independence had not deceived Americans.
