Sharkey Wants to Fight Tunney Now

NEW YORK, May 21.—(AP)—Jack Sharkey wants a fight with Gene Tunney for the heavyweight championship, and he wants it right away, but he will pause long enough to his counsel on the heavyweight title to meet Jack Dempsey if Dempsey demands such a match.

That was the opinion today at the former "rob" in Uncle Sam's army, who last night crashed the heavyweight title aspirations of Jimmy Walker, a fellow Irishman, with a bomb-throwing display of speed, skill and punching power in five rounds at the Madison stadium.

"I have signed to contract with Richard to fight Dempsey," he said. "I'm going to beat him. I won't enter the ring again until I get a real big punch. The fight last night vindicated my judgment, my confidence in myself and what I can do, so that I feel now I am entitled to a shot at Tunney right away."

Jack was in a huge mood as he appeared at Richard's office today to collect his share of the \$111,000 "gate."

"The money, the money," he cried joyfully, as he stepped forward, hand in the promoter's. Jack Richard, "dickhead ally," he said, at the appearance of a new and colorful member in the heavyweight circle, promptly turned over a check for \$50,000, representing 15 per cent of the gate receipts. Walker received a similar amount.
