Dan O'Brien, police chief of San Francisco and father of the player, who is featured in "Harve" at the Liberty theatre, saw to that. One of the first presents he bought for his baby son was a pair of boxing gloves.

On a warrant authorized by Sir William Jowett-Hicks, home secretary, police seized papers belonging to the trade group and searched the building for several days.

If the break is announced as expected, it will mean the cabinet has decided Russia's position is weak and acceptance of relations by Great Britain will force Moscow to approach western nations in a new spirit.
