British Warships Ordered To Egypt

Gunboats Sent out Because of Unfriendly Situation Created by Extremists in Report

LONDON, May 30, (UP)—Three British warships have been ordered to Egyptian ports as a measure of protection to foreign lives in that country.

Extremists in Egypt "who have been endeavoring to create an unfriendly situation and sentiment which is not warranted by the actual situation," are responsible for the British decision to send the warships, the admiralty said.

Dispatch of the warships to Egyptian ports has created a considerable furor here among the people, as well as members of parliament and the house of commons.

MANILA, May 30, (UP)—Understate government secret service agents were today investigating reports of a plot to cripple United States navy activities in the Philippines. According to reports, Filipino agitators joined with Chinese nationalists in the Philippines in a plot which was to have culminated in the destruction of the naval arsenal at Cavite, to prevent shipment of munitions from there to American naval units in China.

Fifteen Balloons Raise For Big Race

Huge Gas Bags Start off in 1927 National Classic; Fear High Winds May Carry Some to Sea

AKRON, O., May 30, (UP)—Fifteen balloons with American civilian and service aeronauts in their baskets, rose from the Akron-Cleveland speedway late in the afternoon of Memorial Day and drifted slowly off towards the northeast in the 1927 national balloon race.

Made heavy by downpour during the morning, the huge gas bags rose into a drizzle of rain and soon their pilots were leaving out ballasts in an effort to attain altitude.

A crowd of 35,000 watched the start of the race, which was without incident. The first balloon rose at 5 p. m., the others following at intervals of a few minutes.
