

I. C. C. Blocks Rate Cut by Railroads

WASHINGTON, June 1, (AP)—A revision of livestock rates between western producing points and the Chicago packing plants, which railroads proposed to make effective today, has been blocked by an order of the interstate commerce commission.

The commission held the proposed revision would result in a substantial increase on most of the traffic affected and ordered the western railroads to maintain their present schedules until January 1, pending an investigation to determine the reasonability of the new rates.

Illustrating the effect of the schedules which it suspended, the commission said that the livestock rates from St. Paul to Chicago on the present basis is 20 1/2 cents per 100 pounds, while the proposed rate would be 33 cents; from Sioux Falls to Chicago, a present rate of 23 1/2 cents per 100 pounds would become 29 1/2, while from Omaha the present rate of 26 cents would become 28 1/2 cents.

The illustrations were said to represent the effect of the schedules from all contiguous territory to the points mentioned.

FEDERAL WORKERS GET HALF HOLIDAYS

Employees of the Federal government may take it easy on all Saturdays every summer, according to an executive order signed by President Coolidge on May 9 which reads as follows:

It is ordered that from the first Saturday of June to the last Saturday of September, both inclusive, of each year until further notice, four hours, exclusive of time for luncheon, shall constitute a days work on Saturdays for all clerks and other employees of the Federal government, wherever employed; and all executive or other orders in conflict herewith, except the Executive Order of April 4, 1908, relating to certain naval stations, are hereby revoked.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 1, (U.P.) The 139th general assembly of the Presbyterian church has reached a peaceful conclusion, despite threats that controversial religious debates might throw the gathering into bitter wrangling.

The assembly ended its session Wednesday afternoon with the completion of committee elections. The 1928 meeting will be held in Tulsa, Oklahoma.

The most recent barrier hurdled by the church men in their program of harmony concerned the Buchanan-New York Synod judicial case, which threatened for a time to plunge the delegates into hot discussion in the virgin birth of Christ.

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
