

Klamath Pelicans Win from Medford

The Klamath Pelicans flew home from Medford Sunday night with heads held high and another decisive baseball victory in the beans which are rapidly filling with honors gleaned in the Southern Oregon league.

By a 14 to 3 score, the Klamath team—the best that has ever carried the colors of this city onto a diamond—took another step forward in its unbroken stride toward championship laurels in the league this season.

The local boys tied up the game in its early stages Sunday. With four runs in the first inning, one in the second and four again in the third, the Pelicans quickly put their opponents on the defensive—a stand which they failed to surpass during the remainder of the game.
