SAN RAFAEL, Calif., June 14. (AP)—Jamon, Zuni entrant in the Redwood highway Indian marathon from San Francisco to Grants Pass, Ore., led the field when he arrived here at 1:25 p. m. today. He announced he would rest here two hours.

Jamon wins the \$100 first prize offered by the Marvellous Marin boosters' organization for the first Indian to arrive here. His running time from San Francisco was 1:18. Exclusive of the ferry trip, the distance was 15 miles.

Second across the line was Rushing Water and Flying Cloud, both Karook Indians, entered by the Oregon Cavemen. Their running time from San Francisco was 1:34. They did not stop. Melika and Choche, the other Zuni entrants from New Mexico, arrived together in third place. Their running time from San Francisco was 1:37.4. They did not stop.
