J. L. Morgan Looks Over New Oil Well

J. L. Morgan, of Denver, Colo., and associated with the Ohio Oil company, a subsidiary of the Standard Oil company, for a number of years, has spent the past few days in Klamath Falls visiting the location of the Southern Oregon Oil company's well three miles southeast of Bonanza.

Mr. Morgan has been engaged in the operating end of the petroleum industry for the past 13 years and after checking over the structure chosen by J. E. Loreman for a deep test well, stated that it was "beyond doubt, the best bet in Oregon."

"I have been visiting the various operations in Oregon and Washington and it is my opinion that the Bonanza structure presents the best possibilities for opening up a new field," Mr. Morgan stated.

"I have known of Mr. Loreman's success in various fields in the Rocky Mountain district and I feel that he has an excellent chance of bringing in a well on the location he has chosen near Bonanza. He has erected a very substantial derrick, two boilers and from his past record I am convinced that he will make a thorough test of the structure."

Mr. Morgan's operations were confined principally to the Salt Creek and Muddy fields in Wyoming. The Ohio Oil company, with which he was associated, is the largest production company in the world.
